He predicted a growth of a Democratic spirit in England which will overthrow the present form of government and make the country a republic. A recent speech of the Prince of Wales in which he expressed a desire to live to see England a republic look like this prophesy also would be fulfilled.

"He painted a dark future for the United States. He said at the close of the century a feeling of unrest will seize the people. This feeling will be the outgrowth of unequal social and economic conditions."


