Proceedings of Annual School Meeting District No. 7.
 Harrison, Neb. June 25th, 1900.
 Meeting was called to order by Moderator Bartell at half past 2 o'clock p. m., director Rohwer, acting as secretary of the meeting the minutes of the last annual meeting were read and on motion were adopted, after which a report of the Treasurer was presented, which showed a surplus of \$10.65, on hand over and above the running expenses of the past year and that the District was entirely out of debt. On motion the Treasurer's report was adopted. The report of the director for the past year was presented, read and adopted. The resignation of L. Gerlach as district treasurer was presented to the meeting for consideration, and accepted. The meeting then proceeded to elect a Director, which was done by ballot and resulted in the election of W. H. Davis.
 On motion Jeff Hewitt was nominated for Treasurer, there being no other candidate he was unanimously elected for the unexpired term L. Gerlach. The board reported the total valuation of assessable property, real and personal for the year 1900, was \$43,000, and on motion the meeting voted a tax levy for

general and through consideration of the subject it was decided to enlarge the north building so as to make two 25 foot rooms. J. H. Bartell submitted a plan which he estimated could be built, for about \$375.00, and the construction of the addition was left to the discretion of the Board, whether it should be built by contract or otherwise and were so general school purposes of 25 mills. The next subject for consideration was the building an extra school room to the present inadequate building. After a doted to build, on motion the school board were instructed to collect from all scholars attending the Harrison school whose residence is outside the district 50c per month for the primary, 75c per month for the intermediate and \$1.00 per month for the higher room, and all above 9th grade should furnish their own books. Also, that a receipt from the district treasurer to the teacher must be presented to the teacher before the scholar would be admitted to attend the school. The number of months of school the district should have during the ensuing year was left to the judgement of the school board.
 On motion meeting adjourned.

Proceedings of Populist County Convention.
 The county convention of the People's Independent party, convened at the court house in Harrison, last Saturday afternoon as per call of the chairman and secretary. Chairman Christensen called the convention to order and stated the object of the meeting, after which Charles Biehle and J. G. Merriam, were elected temporary chairman and secretary respectively.
 On motion the convention proceeded to select delegates to the various conventions to be held within the state during the fall campaign.
 Following delegates were elected to attend the different conventions: State Lincoln July 11th, J. G. Crawford, Charles Biehle and J. G. Merriam.
 Congressional Broken Bow July 9th, Claus Christensen, Wm. J. A. Raum and L. C. Lewis.
 Senatorial, 14th district S. M. Thomas, W. D. Lyon and L. L. Wilson.
 Representative, 53rd District July 26th, Claus Christensen, James Nolan and Wm J. A. Raum.
 After the selection of delegates, the next order of business was the nomination of a candidate for County Attorney. Two names were proposed, J. C. Alexander of Ardmore and W. O. Patterson of this place, after which the name of Mr. Alexander was withdrawn and W. O. Patterson was unanimously nominated for Co. Attorney.
