OBITUARY.
 One of the saddest accidents which
 has occurred in Sioux county in years,
 occurred just before nine o'clock, on last
 Friday morning. Mr. and Mrs. Downey,
 parents of Mrs. R. T. Neese, started from
 their home just outside of town, to go
 to the canyon, to spend the day, they
 had gone about 3 miles, when the clevis
 came off one of the double trees, which
 frightened the horses, and after trying
 in vain to conquer them, Mr. Downey
 was thrown out, and the way on tongue
 struck him in the temple, rendering him
 unconscious, and death came within a
 half hour. Mrs. Downey, was also in-
 jured, but her anxiety to assist her husband
 made her forget her suffering. Burt
 Eckernst, saw the accident at a distance
 and hastened with all possible speed to
 the scene, and did all he could, after
 which he made all possible haste to town
 and summoned assistance, several went
 out and prepared the body and removed
 it to his late home, as usual Dr. Phinney
 was there, to do all he could to relieve
 suffering, and did not leave until the
 body had been prepared for burial, word
 was sent to his daughter Mrs. Neese,
 and also to his other daughter in the east.
 Mrs. Neese came at once, the funeral
 arrangements were perfected by their
 pastor, Father McNamara, and was
 held at the court house on last Satur-
 day morning, at 10:30 o'clock, a large
 host of friends were present to pay their
 last tribute of respect to the departed
 soul whom they had all loved in life.
 The sermon was delivered by Father
 McNamara and was most appropriate,
 the moral was one very fitting to all,
 if they would only apply it to themselves
 which was to live, so as to be ready to
 die when the summons came. The great
 sorrowful family will have the sympathy
 of the entire community.

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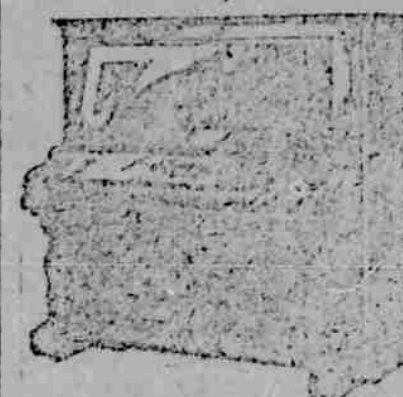
