While we did not hear any of the evidence given for or against Charles Russell, who was declared to be guilty of the murder of A. L. Staudenmaier, last May by what we believe to be one of the most intelligent set of Jurors that we have ever seen sit in a jury box to pass judgement upon a criminal or civil case. Yet, so far as we have been able to learn the verdict rendered, condemning Charles Russell to State prison for life, meets the approbation of 9 tenths of all those with whom we have conversed on the subject. If Charles is guilty of the awful crime, of which he has been convicted, he will have time for reflection and repentance. On the other hand if he is not guilty something in the future will come to light to prove his innocence, and thereby an innocent man will not have to suffer the death penalty unjustly.

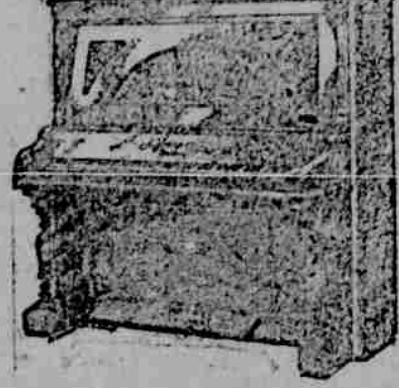
