Hen. D. I. Murphy, former commissioner of pensions, now residing in this city in a recent interview said: "During the national encampment of the G. A. R. at Philadelphia a year ago, the pension question and the attitude of this administration towards the civil war veterans was the principal topic under consideration. A special committee was appointed to wait upon the president and protest against the policy being carried out in the pension office. This committee was called on President McKinley on the morning of September 4, 1898. They presented to him the complaints of their comrades and urged a change in the pension policy. They even went so far as to tell the president that the G. A. R. might even ask for the removal of the commissioner of pensions.

"Replying to the committee, President McKinley gave them plainly to understand that he would sustain the commissioner, no matter how strongly the encampment might condemn him, and added this astounding declaration: "There is no use denying the fact, gentlemen, that the money power of the country is against any further expansion of the pension bill."
