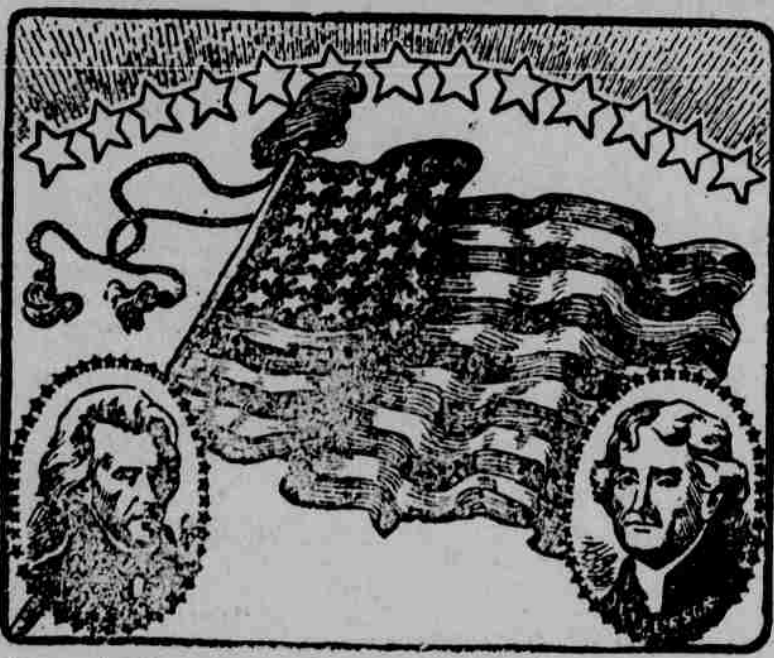

RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were adopted by the National Irrigation Congress, November 24, 1900.

"We hail with satisfaction the fact that both of the great political parties of the nation in the last campaign declared in favor of the reclamation of arid America, in order that settlers might build homes on the public domain, and to that end we urge upon Congress that national appropriations commensurate with the magnitude of the problem should be made for the preservation of the forests and the reforestation of denuded areas as natural storage reservoirs and for the construction by the National Government as part of its policy internal improvement of storage reservoirs and other works for flood protection and to save for use in aid of navigation and irrigation the waters which now run to waste and for the development of artesian and subterranean sources of water supply.

"The waters of all streams should forever remain subject to public control and the right of the use of the water for irrigation should inhere in the land irrigation, and beneficial use be the basis of mesur and the limit of the right.

"The work of building the reservoirs necessary to store the floods should be done directly by the government under existing statutes relating to the employment of labor and work and under laws that will give to all American citizens a free and equal opportunity to get first employment, and a home on the land.

"We commend the efficient work of the various bureaus of the national government in the investigation of the physical and legal problems and other conditions relating to irrigation and in promoting the adoption of more effective law customs and methods of irrigated agriculture, and urge upon congress the necessity of providing liberal appropriations for this important work.

A Letter From Dr. Shafer.

GEO. D. CANON, Editor Press-Journal,
Sarcy, Ark, Nov. 26, 1900

Dear Sir:
I arrived here some two weeks ago all safe and sound. It has been nice and warm weather since I arrived here, except two small frosts, and it has been raining more or less every other day, but last night it froze a little. But, at present writing it is nice and warm, nearly all the time since I am here. Kids, white and black go barefooted. I have been through all the country east, west, north and south, and I find the country for six or eight miles around this town—the land all worn out. I have been out to the land I traded for, but I discovered that I had been badly defrauded; the surveyor did not survey the land my deed called for, it is two miles north of the land that was surveyed to me, and the land lays in the hills and rocks and is no good. I shall not improve it. The principle product is cotton. I was to the cotton market several times and I was surprised at the amount of cotton on the market it looks like an ocean of teams loaded with from one to three bales of cotton; a bale of cotton weighs about 475 to 400 lbs. I counted the teams on one street and there were 237. other streets leading to the market had not so many teams on them.

This country is good for fruit, especially apples are very nice and plenty; Peaches are not a sure crop, every year. Not very much grain raised here and no grass for pasture, only such as grows is no good and I find there can be no tamegrass started to last, it soon burns out. I think I will stay here this winter and will in the spring go to some other place. I have not made up my mind where I will go to. My health is especially good ever since I arrived. Plenty of work here of all kinds and good schools, cattle, horses and mules, also sheep are high in price. Some very good horses here, worth \$100 to \$150; Mules \$75 to \$100; Cows \$30 to \$40; Sheep \$6 to \$8; Hogs \$4 to \$5 00 per cwt.
