

Cremation Becoming Popular.
The trustees of Mount Auburn cemetery, Cambridge, Mass., say in their annual report that cremation seems to be growing in favor. The first incineration there was on April 18, 1900, and since then fifty bodies have been cremated. One hour is required for the incineration of a body, and in two hours after the cremation the ashes can be delivered in a copper casket, terra cotta urn, or wooden casket. No incinerations are made at Mount Auburn on Sunday, unless the cause of death is certified to have been a contagious or infectious disease.

CONFEDERATE REUNION.
Memphis, Tenn., March 10.—At a recent meeting of the general executive committee of the Confederate reunion for 1901 a committee was appointed to join with the several commercial bodies of Memphis to visit Washington and invite President McKinley to be the guest of the city of Memphis on the occasion of the reunion in May next. The committee will leave for the national capital in a few days.

As the time for holding the reunion approaches the several committees are becoming more active. The city is being canvassed by the committee on hotels and accommodations and every available room is being registered. A. D. Langstaff, secretary of the commissary committee, a sub-organization of the general committee in charge of Confederate reunion arrangements, has been very active in the past week or so in the discharge of the duties assigned to him. He is engaged in planning ways and means for caring for the Confederate veterans when they come to the reunion. Many of the commands will very likely bivouack in order to observe strict army regulations and if this should prove true they will have to be cared for the same as if they were in actual service again, but with more care for their comfort. The commissary committee is to look after these matters. Mr. Langstaff announces that it is the purpose of the committee to have the means of caring for every Confederate veteran whether he is able to pay his own way or not, and they will do so if it is possible. They want it understood that the commissary committee is not organized to look only after those who are able to pay their own way, but to look after the rest as well.

MOUTH-BREATHING.

The General Health is Broken Down by Breathing Through the Mouth.

Few people realize what an important organ the nose is. It is the first of the organs of respiration, and unless its functions are well performed the whole breathing process is deranged. The nostrils are not open cavities with smooth walls through which the air passes in and out, as it would through a rubber tube. They are divided into several compartments by bony projections covered with mucous membrane, and the volume of air in entering, is broken up into several streams, so that all of it comes in contact with the lining membrane. This warm and moist membrane catches the dust and other impurities, and warms the air so that it will do no harm when coming in contact with the more delicate membrane in the bronchial tubes and lungs. When the nose is stopped up from any cause one must breathe through the mouth and if this is continued for any length of time the general health will inevitably suffer. The mouth itself suffers first. The mucous membrane loses its moisture and becomes inflamed. The air is neither warmer nor purified, and it irritates the lining membrane of the air passages all the way down to the lungs, so that a condition of sluggish inflammation is excited. But the general effects are more serious than the local. One who is a mouth-breather never gets enough air. During the day he suffers less in this respect, for the nerve centers are more active and force the respiratory muscles to act more energetically; but at night this vigilance is relaxed, the amount of inspired air is greatly reduced and all the tissues suffer for want of oxygen. For this reason the mouth-breather always feels tired and out of sorts in the morning. The mind suffers as well as the body and mouth-breathing children are almost always backward in their studies. A child who always breathes with open mouth and whose voice has a nasal twang, should be examined and treated at the earliest possible moment, for the longer the trouble exists the worse it is for the child mentally, morally, and physically.

FINDERS OF AMERICA.

Buddhist Priest Sonoda Tries to Rob Columbus of His Laurels.

The Rev. Shuye Sonoda, Buddhist priest of Japan, has returned to San Francisco from Mexico, with what he regards as convincing proof that his people discovered America 1,000 years before Columbus and carried their faith along the Pacific coast from Alaska to Mexico. Sonoda has been assisted by Senor Batres, archaeologist of the Mexican government, says a special dispatch to the Chicago Record. Sonoda followed the chronicles of Hoelshahn, a Buddhist monk, who, in 499 A. D., returned to his native land with an account of explorations that reached to a land he called Fu Sang, now identified with Mexico because of the maize plant. Sonoda found innumerable evidences of Buddhist influence over the natives of Mexico. Some of these were the Mexican zodiac, with its twenty-eight hours, Buddha Zaca, Oriental letterings and signs on temples, stones, images and pottery, and hundreds of names which are slightly corrupted from the Japanese. The temples he found invariably facing south, as in Tibet, the home of Buddhism, and in the mosaics at Utlia he found the common cross of Tibet. He also found strong racial resemblances in features between the Mexican and California mission Indians and the Japanese. So strong were these resemblances in features that when a California mission Indian was dressed in Japanese costume and photographed, Prof. John Fyer of the chair of Oriental languages, University of California, declared the photograph was of a Japanese of the northern islands and bore no resemblance to the California Indian.

Powers Had Pie.

Some years ago at the beginning of his career, James T. Powers, the comedian with "San Toy," the charming musical comedy at the Museum, was in Philadelphia, looking for something to do. He finally made an engagement with a man who was doing a turn in a vaudeville house. Powers was to receive \$10 a week and his board, with the promise that he was to have meat three times a day. They went to a nearby restaurant for their first meal, and the vaudeville man ordered two glasses of milk and two pieces of apple pie; for dinner the same order was given; for supper Powers was again regaled with two pieces of apple pie and two glasses of milk. Powers ventured to remonstrate, saying that he was under the impression that he was to have meat at all his meals. This did not discomfit his friend, who merely called: "Walter, make those pieces of apple pie, mince."

Post of King's Limner.

One of the most desirable posts at Windsor castle is that of "the king's limner," who in ancient times decorated books and manuscripts with initial letters, and who now prepares the parchment commissions when his majesty is pleased to confer knighthood or some other honor upon one of his subjects. The gentleman who now fills the post has extraordinary skill with the pen and brush and his diplomas and certificates were greatly admired for their exquisite taste and skillful execution. He receives a salary of \$2,500 a year. The clockmaker at Windsor castle receives the same compensation, and it is his business to keep all of the timepieces in repair.

A Valued Souvenir.

Colonel Walter French, the file clerk of the house of representatives, has an unusual souvenir of the visit of the Prince of Wales, now England's king, to this country many years ago. It is a large pink ticket to the "musical festival in honor of Lord Renfrew, October 18, 1860, at the Music hall, Boston." Colonel French purchased the ticket, but did not use it, except to paste in his interesting scrapbook of that period.

Those giving \$5 or more in excess of last year will receive a bronze medal bearing the face of John Wesley; Sunday school scholars giving \$1 will receive a gilt medal with the face of Francis Asbury and donors belonging to the Epworth League will receive a bronze medal of Bishop Ninds.
