The result of the election generally makes everyone feel good a little.

W. J. A. Raum's majority was the largest of any candidate ever elected in Sioux county.

Mr. J. B. Burke is the first man to be elected in Sioux county by petition when there was an opposition candidate.

Mr. Raum desires to thank the voters of Sioux county for the manner in which they have put their approval on his actions as a county official. He will endeavor to fill the office in as satisfactory manner for the coming two years as he has for the past two.

Now that the election of Judge Sedgwick is assured it is to be earnestly hoped that he will fulfill all the best things said about him. After all it is not of so much importance to what party a man belongs as to how well he fills the position of trust which the people give him.

The vote in New York where the power of Tammany was overthrown in no uncertain manner was a victory as Hon. Seth Low expressed it, "of the people." It had a parallel in the city of Omaha where the corrupt Republican rule was overthrown in the same manner "by the people."

Now that the campaign is over, the warning factions in some localities will certainly have a good time to consider with a cool brain the nasty things they have said about "the other fellows." If they were not true, or their statements have been colored by partisan feelings, it appears that these reflections will not be altogether pleasant. It has been fortunate that there has been so little of this necessary in Sioux county.

Commander Raum of Robinson Post at Crawford received this week a copy of the resolution passed by Farmington Post No. 5, of Valero, California, which urges the senators and representative in the United States Congress to urge the passage of a bill which will give at least a part of the building of Government ships to the navy yards of our country. The reason of this resolution is two fold. One is that the navy yards as they are now conducted give a preference to veterans of the Civil and Spanish American wars. The work can be done as economically by these navy yards as by private contract and by their giving a preference to Uncle Sam's veterans, will give many of them employment which could not get it otherwise although they are capable to hold the position. This is a move in the right direction and should be encouraged by all veterans as well as by those who have a desire to lessen the power of the trust.

A LITTLE LEARNING

"A little learning is a dangerous thing, drink deep or taste not the Pyrenean spring." This is a familiar quotation and one which is apt to be misleading. It is often true but again it is often not true. Often it is the case that when one has tasted "a little learning" it does not open ones eyes of his own importance in the world but serves only to whet his appetite for more and greater things. To such a person his learning is not a dangerous thing but a source of a great deal of longing which when prolonged, means pain.

But before anything is attained one must desire, so that this longing sometimes, in fact often, is the first step to attainment.

Do not be alarmed at little learning but be alarmed lest it does not grow to be a wider knowledge.

SOCIALITY.

Although the surface of everyday life generally seems placid, especially in Harrison, there are frequently occurrences happening which prove that the undercurrents are of high temperature and a little more heat applied makes them bubble to the top, causing a commotion even to the surface. A stranger is likely to be surprised at these commotions, but if he observes the cause, he invariably finds that the undercurrent which caused these eruptions was selfishness. Sociability is a preventative of selfishness because it causes one to lose themselves in understanding, and perhaps admiring, others. In times of common danger, this selfishness is not manifested because all share equally in the dan-

ger and in the needed protection.

These are two things which keep this element of selfishness from predominating. Since danger is not to be denied, it is evident that sociability is. Then let us promote it by getting together and discussing the things which have an interest for all of us.
