For Governor. Gen. Victor Vilque.

During the last few weeks a movement has been set on foot looking to the nomination of Gen. Victor Vilque for the place of Governor for the Fusion forces this fall. As the Fremont Herald states it, "It is time the office was seeking the man." It could certainly not wait and find a man more capable and deserving than Gen. Vilque.

All who have had the opportunity of meeting and knowing the noble old General, will recognize at once that the Fusion forces could not unite on a man who will give the citizens and tax payers of the state of Nebraska a more conservative and judicious administration of the states affairs.

He served in a foreign war before coming to the United States and, at one time, a heavy ransom was placed on his head. After coming to the United States he served through the civil war as a private and was mustered out as a brevet Major General.

He is one of the very few men who received the thanks of Congress for gallant and meritorious service.

He emigrated to Nebraska among the first settlers in the early seventies and secured a homestead in the eastern part of the state. While living on this homestead he irregularly intervals organized emigrant trains at his farm, for the purpose of passing farther west to settle and civilize the state.

While in charge of these trains, often had business with the Indians who were then roaming over the plains of Nebraska and the great west.

Probably there is no one to whom more credit is due for the early settling of the Republican Valley than General Vilque.

General Vilque remained to Lincoln after it had become a city and published a daily Democratic newspaper.

He served as minister to a South American country under the便民 government. When the war broke out between Spain and the United States, he offered his services to the Government and, at W. J. Bryan's request, he was commissioned Lieutenant Colonel of the 3rd Nebraska.

It was while holding this position that the writer came to know him and to know him is to love and respect him.

When Mr. Bryan resigned, after the war was over, Col. Vilque was promoted to the command of the regiment and given a colonel's commission.

He served in this capacity until he was mustered out with the regiment on May 11, 1890, at Augusta, Georgia.

Since that time he has been living a retired life at his residence in Lincoln and except for being one of the party which was with Bryan on his tour throughout the state in 1890, he has not taken a very active part in politics.

He expressed himself at a meeting of the Democratic editors of the state recently in a manner thoroughly characteristic when he said "I am a Democrat," not this kind of a Democrat, nor that kind of a Democrat but a Democrat.

There is enough in these two sentences to make up the opinion on the present issue plain. There is enough in his history to convince the most skeptical, that he is a man such as the Fusion forces of the state of Nebraska can be proud to unite on as their next candidate for Governor.

Let us nominate and elect Gen. Victor Vilque the next Governor of Nebraska.

Floating Disinfecting Plants.

Feed Excess in Wyoming.

Wyoming has 35,000,000 acres of good grazing land. There are about 1,000,000 cattle and 2,000,000 sheep in the state. Cattle browse at random and leave behind more than they eat so that the range may provide sustenance for two or three herds, one following the other.
