The two Republican papers of Crawford are now at loggerheads over the candidate for governor this fall. Glad to see this example of Republican harmony.

What a blessing it would have been if we had a government epidemic in Lincoln last winter when the disgraced senatorial fight was on.

"There are thousands of citizens of this republic, following the plow, as noble, as honest, as intelligent as Prince Henry or prince anybody else. (Applause on the Democratic side.) Why do the American people give heed to his foolish and disgraceful flunkies and not to the present administration? What difference does it make to us whether he is a brother of the emperor?" For Governor - Gen. Victor Vitquoin.
During the last few weeks a movement has been set on foot looking to the nomination of Gen. Victor Vitquoin for the place of Governor for the Fusion forces this fall. As the Fremont Herald states it, "It is time the office was seeking the man." It could certainly not seek and find a man more capable and deserving than Gen. Vitquoin.

All who have had the opportunity of meeting and knowing the noble old General, will recognize at once that the Fusion forces could not unite on a man who will give the citizens and tax payers of the state of Nebraska a more conservative and judicious administration of the states affairs.

He served in a foreign war before coming to the United States and at one time, a heavy ransom was placed on his head. After coming to the United States he served through the civil war. He enlisted as a private and was mustered out as a brevet Brigadier General.

He is one of the very few men who received the thanks of Congress for gallant and meritorious service. He emigrated to Nebraska among the first settlers in the early seventies and secured a homestead in the eastern part of the state. While living on this homestead he at regular intervals organized emigrant trains at his farm for the purpose of pushing farther west to settle and civilize the state.

While in charge of these trains, he often had business with the Indians who were then roaming over the plains of Nebraska and the great west.

Probably there is no one to whom more credit is due for the early settling of the Republican Valley than General Vitquoin.

General Vitquoin removed to Lincoln after it had become a city and published a daily Democratic newspaper.

He served as minister to a South American country under Cleveland's administration. When the war broke out between Spain and the United States, he offered his services to the Government and, at W. J. Bryan's request he was commissioned Lieutenant Colonel of the 3rd Nebraska.

It was while holding this position that the writer came to know him and to know him to be a true and respect him.

When Gen. Bryan resigned, after the war was over, Col. Vitquoin was promoted to the command of the regiment and given a Colonel's commission.

He served in this capacity until he was mustered out with the regiment on May 11th, 1899, at Augusta, Georgia.

Since that time he has been living a retired life at his residence in Lincoln and except for being one of the party which was with Bryan on his tour throughout the state in 1900, he has not taken a very active part in politics.

He expressed himself at a meeting of the Democratic editors of the state recently in a manner thoroughly characteristic when he said "I am a Democrat" not this kind of a Democrat, nor that kind of a Democrat but a Democrat.

There is enough in these two sentences to make his position on the present issue plain. There is enough in his history to convince the most skeptical, that he is a man such as the Fusion forces of the state of Nebraska can be proud to unite on as their next candidate for Governor.

Let us nominate and elect Gen. Victor Vitquoin the next Governor of Nebraska.

Feed Labels in Wyoming.

Wyoming has 35,000,000 acres of good grazing lands. There are about 1,000,000 cattle and 2,000,000 sheep in the state. Between the cattle men and sheep men exists a feud that not infrequently leads to murder. Sheep as you may or may not know, feed in so close order that when a flock has fed over a range, not a spear of grass remains. Cattle browse at random and leave behind more than they eat so that the range may provide sustenance for two or three herds, one following the other.
