FOUND DEAD ON THE PR'IRIE.
John Caldwell Succumbs While Driving Sheep.

On Tuesday of last week John Caldwell, familiarly known as Farmer John, left Chadron with a band of forty-one sheep, belonging to Henry Simmons and started for John Simmon's place about sixteen miles north west of here. He expected to arrive there that evening and go to Wayside station and there take a train back.

It happened that Mr. Simmons was out of town and no one thought concerning the whereabouts of Mr. Caldwell, until the former's return, Tuesday. Thinking it strange that nothing had been seen or heard of Caldwell, Mr. Simmons immediately left for Paulson's and on reaching there learned that the sheep had drifted in from the north on Friday but without a driver.

Mr. Simmons' suspicions became aroused and a search for the missing man was instituted, beginning Wednesday. A large party left here yesterday morning and scoured the country north and west, finding the dead body about six miles north of Dakota Junction. All appearances indicated that he had become fagged out and badly chilled and sat down to rest falling into a sleep from which he never awakened. The tracks made by Caldwell assisted in his discovery. The body was in a good condition considering the probable length of time it lay and had remained unmolested by the coyotes.

Coroner Chas. E. Furay was summoned and the body brought to town and taken to E. Mead's undertaking rooms. The coroner's jury finding the following verdict:

Furay, Coroner of Dawes county, upon the body of John Caldwell, lying dead, by the jurors upon their oath, do say that the said John Caldwell came to his death by exhaustion caused by exposure to severe storm of rain and sleet and snow while in charge of a band of 41 head of sheep while attempting to drive the same from Chadron, Nebraska to Paulson's ranch on Bohemian creek on Tuesday night, March 25, 1902.

LOOKS BAD FOR FENCES.
 The fence question is the uppermost topic in this section at present and there is scarcely a ranchman to be found but what is more or less interested in it. Fact is not more than one out of 50 of them but what has more or less government land fenced in. To see how strong the determination is on the part of the powers that be to have fences on the public domain removed we herewith quote a special from Washington under date of March 31 which says: The president has ordered the secretary of the interior to issue instructions to the United States district attorney of New Mexico and to special agents of the department suspending until July 1, 1902, the order for taking down fences erected by the class Cattle and Land company in New Mexico.
 The company claimed exemption from the operation of the law on the ground that it had received a land grant from the Mexican government, but the interior department held to the contrary. It was for the purpose of overcoming any hardship which might be entailed on the company that the suspension was made.
 In all other cases the department proposes to enforce the law rigidly in requiring the removal of fences on government lands and has issued instructions for the prosecution of those who fail to comply promptly therewith.—Lusk Herald.
