THE LAND LEASE BILLS

During this session of congress two bills have been introduced having for their object the leasing of idle government lands. They are very similar in import and there is very little difference in the effect they would have on existing conditions in the range country.

The bills provide that all idle government lands shall be leased for a period of ten years with a further option of another ten years to every freeholder at the rate of ten acres of government land to one freehold. This leased land to be subject to homestead entry and to be paid for at the rate of two cents per acre.

The promoters of the bill are, without exception, the men who now own large tracts of land which lies adjacent to large tracts of government land.

They have been securing the use of this government land because of their advantageous position in controlling the water of the region.

They have become alarmed by the fact that the administration has commenced to send out orders that all fences on government land shall come down within sixty days time. If this comes to pass they will be placed in a very tight place and to make a reaction for this they are urging the passage of one of these land leasing bills.

Just what effect either of these bills will have on the small stockman is enigmatical. If he now owns enough land so that this bill will enable him to lease enough more land to make him a reasonable living and perhaps a little more, he will be all right.

But if he happens to be one of that class who are just starting to make a competency for himself and family and who has not acquired as yet much land, he will certainly be driven out of business.

These advantages accruing from this land which belongs to all the people will be forever lost to him. As a result hundreds of families will be driven from this western country to become wage earners or renters of farms farther east.

This is a result which no intelligent person can deny.

When these people are forced to leave it is inevitable that the control of the country will pass more or less gradually into the hands of the large cattle men who will by their money be able to squeeze the small man out of business.

This result means that the merchants and business men of the small western towns will be forced to compete with the wholesale prices of eastern houses. Which is equivalent to saying that they must go out of business.

Who then will be benefited by the passage of this land leasing bill?

Certainly not the small stockman trying to get a start in the same way that those who are now classed among the large owners did a few years ago. Certainly not the small country merchant and business man who depends on the number of customers who buy from him at a fair degree of profit.

It then must be the man who owns the large holdings and him alone.

Is this the man that you business men of Chadron are interested in protecting or is it the small man who patronizes you and makes it possible by his presence for you to live? It is time something was being done to show where you stand and if you want the country depopulated, then let it be known. If you want it otherwise it is high time you were awakened to the situation and letting our representatives in Congress know what your sentiment are. The business men of Rushville have passed resolutions denouncing the bill. Why cannot the business men of Chadron do likewise?

The above facts are our sentiments and we feel that every business man in all the towns, as well as the small ranch men should put forth a vigorous effort denouncing the bill as it now stands for if you wait until it becomes a law it will then be too late.
