

During this session of congress two bills have been introduced having for their object the leasing of idle government lands. They are very similar to import and there is very little difference in the effect they would have on existing conditions in the range country.

The bills provide that all idle govern ent lands shall b. leased for a period of ten years with a further option of another ten years to every freeholder at the rate of ten acres of government land to one freehold. This leased land to be sulject to homestead entry and to be paid for at the rate or two cents per acre. The promoters of the bill are, without
