But were the cattlemen all united, that would not make the land-leasing scheme appear any less objectionable as a measure to shut down on the measure to public domain by which alone the western country can build up and strengthened. The west waits every available acre productively employed at its greatest capacity and this object would be frustrated by turning the land over in huge tracts to the cattle syndicates to the exclusion of all others - Recorder, Rushville.

FENCES LIMITED TO JULY FIRST

Washington, April 26.—Senator Patterson called on the president by appointment this morning to discuss with him the extension of his order which requires fences upon the public domain, to be immediately taken down, and failing to do which, violators to be prosecuted in the courts.

After the situation had been considered pro and con, the president decided that he would extend the time for the removal of fences until July 1, and said that the order would be issued immediately after the cabinet meeting on Thursday next. At the same time the president made it clear that there would be no further extensions, whether in individual cases or generally. The law being upon the statute books, he feels it to be his duty to enforce it, and the only reason for leniency now is that it has stood so long practically as a dead letter that there might be individual cases of serious hardship should the order be immediately put into effect. The president also said that he had numberless complaints from settlers and small cattlemen all over the arid regions, and their rights were entitled to the fullest sympathy of the executive. Senator Patterson says that the president left no room to doubt that he means precisely what he says about enforcing the order for the removal of fences rigidly and impartially after July 1 and that it is quite well enough for those who have fences to understand that July 1 will be the last day of grace. - Rocky Mountain News.

By the act of congress approved April 12, 1902, the following changes are made in the War Revenue Law now in force: Taxes repealed on and after July 1, 1902: Bankers, Brokers, Dealers in grain, securities etc., under Par. 3, Sec. 8, Act of March 3, 1901 (Brokers Class 2). Pawnbrokers, Custom House Brokers, Proprietors of Theatres, etc., Proprietors of Circuses, Proprietors of Public Exhibitions or Shows for Money, Proprietors of Bowling Alleys or Billiard rooms, Dealers in Leaf Tobacco, Dealers in Tobacco, Manufacturers of Tobacco, Manufacturers of Cigars, Stamp Taxes on, Instruments, papers of documents; deliveries or transfers of stock, and sales and agreements of sale or agreements to sell stocks, products or merchandise. (Schedule A.) Wines. (Schedule B.) Seats in parlor palace cars, and berths in sleeping cars. Taxes on legacies and distributive shares of personal property. Excise taxes on persons, firms, companies and corporations engaged in refining petroleum and sugar. Taxes reduced: Fermented Liquors. Their tax reduced to \$1.00 per barrel. Snuff and Tobacco. The tax is reduced to 6 cts. per pound. Cigarettes. The tax on cigarettes weighing more than 3 lbs. per thousand is reduced to \$5.00 per thousand. A drawback or rebate is allowed on all original and unbroken factory packages of smoking and manufactured tobacco and snuff held by manufacturers or dealers on July 1, 1902, to the amount of difference between the higher rate paid and the tax imposed by this act. Claims must be presented within sixty days from July 1st, and must be for \$10.00, or more. The provisions of the present law, relative to mixed flour, remain unchanged except a slight change is made in the definition of mixed flour. Rights accrued or liabilities incurred prior to the repeal are not affected. The estates of all persons dying prior
