STOCK REPORT.

The feeding in the cattle market is very nervous and uncertain owing to the alleged "bull trust" investigations, rumored fair strike of coal-miners, etc., and packers are using all the means in their power to get the market. Last week ended with a very low and depressed market. For the two days this week, however, the market shows more strength, advancing 10 to 15 cts. We quote 1250 to 1500 steers at 5.25 to 4.75; 1450 to 1250, 5.00 to 5.25; 1000 to 1050, 5.25 to 5.75. Fat waters buy 4 1/2 to 5.50, fair heifers up to 5.00, cows 4.40 to 5.50 and poorer kinds down to 1.75. Extremely fat cows or heifers would bring a higher price than above quoted. Calves 3.50 to 7.00, feeders 4.25 to 5.00 and stockers 2.00 to 4.00.

Hogs are about steady with a week ago. Receipts have been moderate and prices range from 6.55 to 7.15.

The past week has seen the highest price of the year for sheep.

This week opens up with the feeling not so strong. Prices for choice lambs are, \$8.50 to \$12.00; yearlings \$5.70 to \$6.15; ewes \$4.00 to \$5.20.
