ment.

The Commencement Exercises of
Chadron Academy are always looked
forward to with great interest by the
people of Chadron and by the friends
of the school far and near, and for a

the city.

Sunday morning, June 14, a large
congregation assembled to hear the
eloquent Baccalaureate sermon by
the Rev. John H. Address, Pastor of
the Congregat onal church and President
of the Board of Trustees. In
the evening the large auditorium of
the Rink Opera house was filled again
by a union congregation who came to
hear the Annual Address to the Stu-
dents, by the Rev. A. E. DuBois, Pas-
tor of the Methodist church.

Monday evening the Alumni Ban-
quet was held at the Depot Hotel.
Nearly a hundred graduates, students
and friends of the Academy set down
to a sumptuous feast which was fol-
lowed by a program of toasts and mu-

How Africans Bear Pain.

A writer in Central Africa gives
these illustrations of the fact that the
black man is much less susceptible
to physical suffering than his white
brother. A Makua whose foot had
been amputated was found the day af-
ter the operation out of bed on the
hospital floor, using the stump for
progression. A Yao who had had
three fingers removed stole away the
next morning to go on a machila jour-
ney of some weeks, using the dam-
aged hand freely. So, too, the expedi-
tions of 1885 against the slave-deal-
ers brought to light many instances
of this callousness. Shells fired into
a stockade unfortunately do not dis-
criminate between men, women and
children. They wound all alike. At
Mosi's women mortally wounded
were to be seen going about picking
up firewood, drawing water and at-
tending to their physical wants, wom-
en who the next day were dead. A
little girl whose leg was amputated
made her way to a pool, where she
sat with the stump dangling in the
water, which she was splashing over
it with her hands, singing all the time
as though nothing was ailing.
