## FOODS FOR BEAUTY.

**Eat Fruit and Green Vegetables if You Would Improve Your Looks.**  
Do you wish to be beautiful? Or, if you possess beauty already, are you anxious to retain it?  
The chances are, in either case, that the answer is yes. Well, then, it all depends to a great extent upon what you eat. Certain kinds of food encourage pulehritude, while others have an opposite tendency. It is worth while to know how to regulate your diet with a view to acquiring beauty, if you have it not, or to retaining it if you are its fortunate possessor.

At the present time Uncle Sam is cultivating, on his experimental farm near Washington, a beauty-making plant. It is called the "fenugreek," and the seeds of it are eaten by the women of Algeria to make them beautiful. Their belief is that it makes them plump and improves their complexions. But the government experts as yet have not reached a satisfactory conclusion as to whether this faith is justified or not. It may be correct, but judgment on the point is suspended.

However, there are foods which undeniably are beauty-makers. It is worth any woman's while to know what they are, and to try them—unless, perchance, she is so perfect physically as not to need them—in her own case, and for her own advantage.

"The best of all beauty-making foods are fresh fruits and vegetables," said Professor H. W. Wiley, the famous government chemist, who is incidental a skilled physician. "They contain relatively little nourishment—a woman could hardly live on them exclusively for any length of time—but for reasons which as yet are imperfectly understood, they possess extraordinary value as healthgivers. If you want bright eyes and a clear complexion, eat plenty of them."

The fact is that most fresh vegetables and fruits are nearly all water. Spinach is 92½ per cent water, cabbage is 77 per cent water, beets are 88 per cent water, carrots are 91 per cent water, cauliflower is 91 per cent water, cucumbers are 96 per cent water, egg plant is 93 per cent water, onions are 78½ per cent water, tomatoes are 96 per cent water, green corn (cut from the cob) is 81½ per cent water and celery is 94½ per cent water. Fruits are pretty nearly all water, though the banana is relatively rich in starch.

Fruits and vegetables, then, are of no great use in supporting the human body. Their value is mainly medicinal, and as beauty-makers they are the chief among foods. It is almost impossible to eat too much of them if a fresh state, though, of course, the diet must include a reasonable proportion of those substances, such as meat which furnish blood and muscle tissue.

**LEGAL CODE OF BABYLON.**  
Measures Taken to Preserve the Peace in 2300 B. C.

A legal code that is nearly 1,000 years older than Moses has been unearthed in Susa, the ancient capital of Ahasuerus. It is in the form of a column of stone five feet high and set forth in 390 paragraphs certain of the rules of law governing Babylon 2300 B. C.

"The Literary Digest says: "In general the old testament principle of an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth" is consistently carried out in this Babylonian code. Among other things it says: "If a man knock out the eye of a freeman his own eye shall be forfeited. If he break one of the members of a man his own member shall be removed." But this rule applied only in the case of freemen. If the suffering party were a slave a payment of money could make good the wrong. The same was true of a freed man. On the other hand, if an inferior struck a superior he was punished with fifty lashes, and if he was a slave his ear was cut off.

The lex talionis was carried on so far that if a surgeon was unsuccessful in performing an operation he was not entitled to any pay. If the patient died under the hand of the surgeon the latter lost his hands. In case the patient was a freeman. If a slave died under his hand he must buy another. In case a builder made a failure of a structure he was also punished with death. Whether imprisonment was one method of punishing wrongdoers does not appear, but evidently if at all applied it was of comparatively small importance. Money fines were, however, very common and were proportionate to the wrong done. He who falsely claimed that another was indebted to him must pay one-third of a mina. Freeman fighting were fined a mina. Theft of an animal was punishable by a fine of thirty times its value. Hammurabi was much concerned for the safety of his highways. A robber who attacked a person on the public road was killed, or if he could not be found then the community in which the crime had taken place was fined a mina in case the life of a human being had been lost."

**A Unique Career.**  
The career of Brigadier General Ed ward M. Hayes (familiarily known as Jack Hayes), who has just been promoted from the colonelcy of the Thirteenth Infantry, is unique in the annals of our army. He enlisted in the army as a boy in 1855 as bugler in the company of which Fitzhugh Lee was second lieutenant. When the war he was enlisted as a private and came out an officer. With the reorganization of the army in 1868 he obtained a commission, since which time he has made a most brilliant record, first on the plains and lately in the Philippines.
