WILL IT BE THE YELLOW PERIL?

More than 25 years ago an English astrologist prophesied that about 1850 a tremendous struggle for supremacy would take place between the Mongolian and Caucasian races and that the United States, as the stronghold of the latter race, would be compelled to bear the brunt of that mighty conflict—and lose.

In the war now on between Russia and Japan the latter shall triumph the world will be threatened with a repetition of the "yellow peril." No student of history can for a moment doubt that Japanese success will mean a coalition, once fully armed and equipped, will be a menace to the peace of the world and threaten civilization itself. The Chinese portion of the yellow race does not know its strength. Like the elephant it knows nothing of the possibilities of its immense bulk. A little learning has brought the Japanese portion of it to a realization of its combined powers and a "little learning is a dangerous thing."

Many people are at a loss to understand, and justly so, who the people of the United States are so inclined to sympathize with Japan in her present trouble with Russia than with the latter. While Japan has always been on more or less friendly terms with the United States, Russia did us a turn during the civil war that it is hard for some people to forget, and many old soldiers are prone to think that if we have any sympathy to spare it should be given to Russia.

No doubt the stand Russia took had much to do with the putting down of the rebellion, for had it not been for the attitude of that country the confederacy would have been given the support of England and France. It is firmly believed by many that had it not been for the appearance at an opportune

time of Russian warships in American ports such assistance would have been tendered the confederacy as would have enabled them to succeed in their endeavor to overthrow the government. These are things to think about.—Lusk Herald.

REGULATIONS PROVIDING FOR THE EXTERMINATION OF SCABIES IN CATTLE.

LINCOLN, NEBRASKA, March 17, 1904.
 For a number of years a contagious parasitic skin disease known as itch, mange or scabies has been a menace to the live stock industry in our state; nearly all herds of cattle on upon the range being infected. The latter part of Sec. 3, and Sec. 12, Chapt. 4, Art. 2, Compiled Statutes of Nebraska, provides that: The Deputy State Veterinarian shall also from time to time give and enforce such directions and prescribe such rules and regulations as to separating, modes of handling, treating, feeding and care for such disease and exposed animals as he shall deem necessary to prevent two classes of animals from coming in contact with each other and perfectly isolate from other domestic animals which have not been exposed thereto, and which are susceptible of becoming infected with the disease, and the said Veterinarian or his agents, are hereby authorized and empowered to enter upon any grounds or premises to carry out all the provisions of this act.

Sec. 13. The Deputy State Veterinarian shall have power to call upon any sheriff, deputy sheriff, or constable, to execute his orders, and such officers shall obey the orders of the Deputy State Veterinarian, and the officers performing such duties as provided for by the act shall receive compensation in return, prescribed by law for like services, to be paid as other expenses are paid, and an officer may arrest without a warrant and take before any magistrate of the county, and hold until a warrant can be issued; any person found violating the provisions of this act and such officers shall immediately notify the county attorney of such arrest, and he shall prosecute the person offending according to law.

Much valuable work has been done through the numerous dipping plants established, however the benefits that might have been obtained had the best remedies been applied have been minimized through the use of such materials as the coal tar or carbolic preparations which are unreliable and inefficient and often injurious to the animals treated.

I therefore deem it my duty under the provisions of the above quoted statutes to institute the following regulations:
 No. 1. On and after April 1st, no materials shall be used for the treatment of cattle diseased with itch, mange, scab, or lice except Lime and Sulphur dip in a formula herein approved and prescribed.

I hereby recommend the following formula:

12 lbs good unslacked Lime
 24 lbs flowers of Sulphur.
 100 gallons of water.
 Thoroughly shake the Lime, add the Sulphur and hold the mixture in from 25 to 30 gallons of water from one to two hours, continually stirring until the sulphur is dissolved, then add sufficient water to make the required proportions. This dip will be not so readily strong to kill itch and lice, lice being harder to destroy than the itch mites. The dip should be kept at a temperature of from 100 degrees to 110 degrees F. Each animal should be retained in the dip two minutes.

No. 2. No dip shall contain less than 8 lbs of sulphur to 100 gallons of water.

No. 3. During the coming months of April, May and June all herds of cattle in which the disease of itch, mange, scab or lice exists, shall be dipped in a Lime and Sulphur dip as above directed. All cattle so dipped to be kept as stock cattle shall be dipped the second time within 5 to 14 days after the first dipping.

No. 4. Owing to the lack of funds to employ assistant Veterinarians pursuant to Sec. 13 herein quoted, I hereby instruct the sheriffs in the counties in which said diseases exist to enforce the foregoing regulations and request that they report the progress of the work to the State Veterinarian. I advise stockmen to make the dip salt unnecessary to pay for the price of the dry materials for the cooking of the same and then add freight on water. If any one desires to purchase a manufactured Lime and Sulphur dip then must calculate that one barrel of concentrated or saturated solution will contain an average of about 100 lbs. of sulphur and would therefore make but 100 gallons of dip of a minimum required strength.

With the good results already obtained by the lime and sulphur dip as used by many of our stockmen, I am confident that we can have the work done thoroughly this spring and the cattle kept out on the range through the summer after the second dipping or away from all infected yards, sheds, corrals and fences until disinfected, we will have exterminated the disease in the state.
