To whom it may concern:—The commissioner appointed to locate a certain road petitioned for by Frank Nitto and others commencing at the NE corner of the NE 1/4 of section 18 running southwest about 1/4 of a mile to where old road leads SE toward SE corner of NE 1/4 of section 18 in township 32 range 55, be laid out and be established as a public road and that portion of old road commencing at NE corner of NE 1/4 of section 18 running south on section line between sections 17 and 18 to half section line running east and west at SE corner of NE 1/4 section 18, thence running northwest to bench in road where new road strikes said bench in old road, to be vacated.
