CHARLES F. COFFEY.

Mr. Coffey is a native of Missouri where he was born March 22, 1847. In 1861 he emigrated with a father to Texas where he passed his young manhood. In 1871, being fond of adventure and partial to the free life led by the cowboys in those exciting days, he began trailing cattle to Wyoming, and two years later he located a ranch and started into the stock business on his own account.

In his candidacy for the lower house of legislature in 1900 he was successful against Allen G. Fisher and received the flattering majority of 385 votes as a testimonial of the remarkable confidence which the people reposed in him.

There are three classes of men who make up legislative bodies. Those most noticed are the forensic members. Those usually the most effective are the silent but quiet workers who labor arduously with individuals and influence their action.

Mr. Coffey is personally identified with all the interests of all the people in his district.
