Receipts of westerners will be very light after Dec. 15th. We expect a brisk demand for butcher stock next month when they will come in better condition.

The Valley of Mexico. The Valley of Mexico is seventy miles in length and forty-seven miles in width. Lake Texcoco, a large bed of water lying immediately to the east of the City of Mexico, is only six feet lower than the level of the street pavements. In 1529 this lake rose and inundated the city, drowning thousands of the inhabitants. The waters of the lake covered the site of the city to a depth of three feet, and remained so for over four years. This danger is now obviated by a great drainage canal.

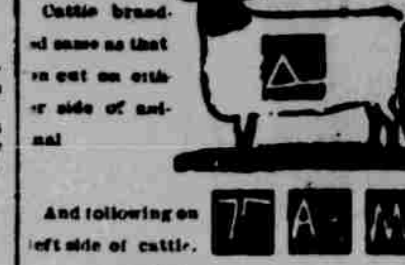

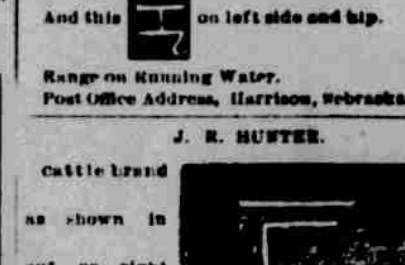

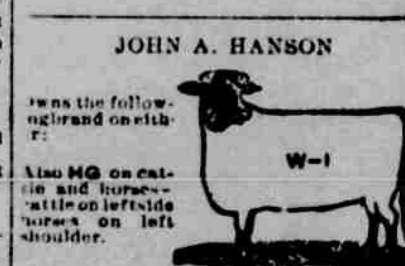


Cattle brand as shown in cut on right side, hip, or shoulder.

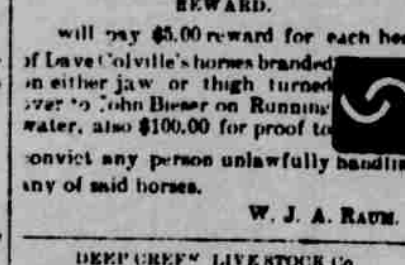

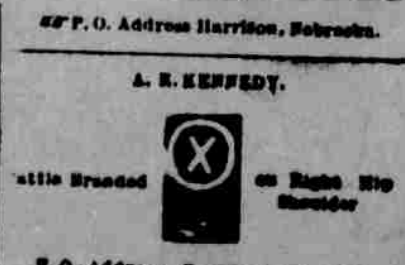
