Although Hon. M. P. Kincaid endeavored to secure the passage of a bill to extend time for establishing residence upon land for those who filed prior to November, there is no hope of this measure becoming a law. Therefore those who filed under the new homestead law will be compelled to commence residence upon the land within the six months after date of filing. Even if congress was favorably disposed, with the amount of work on hand, it would be impossible to take up the measure before expiration of six months. The only thing left for these who filed to do, is to commence residence within the prescribed six months, as they expected when making their filings. —Valentine Republican.

THE ATTORNEYS ASK A QUEER QUESTION.

The Supreme Court Has Been Asked to Tell the Difference Between Real Estate and Wire Fence.

What is the difference between real estate and a wire fence? This is a conundrum propounded to the supreme court by Attorneys Ed Clarke and Hamer who are defending John Junod and Harry Junod of Cherry Co. These two men were convicted of stealing six miles of fence with which David A. Hancock of Missouri had surrounded his ranch in Cherry Co. The wire was said to have been found at the home of the Junods, but it was not identified by any witnesses, say the attorneys, as that coming from the gaps on the Hancock ranch. Intimating that others may have had a hand in the work the attorneys say: "A great many miles of fence is not a popular thing where homesteaders are going upon the land." The Junods were prosecuted under sections 114 and 119 of the criminal code. These refer to money, good chattels. The attorneys aver that fencing is none of these. Say there: "The testimony shows that the wire was fastened to fence posts by staples and that the fence posts were securely anchored in the ground." That being true, and it is not controverted, the wire alleged to have been taken, was a part of the real estate and there is no such thing as larceny of real estate. The fence could no more be stolen than the land itself. Lincoln Star.

The Valley of Mexico. The Valley of Mexico is seventy miles in length and forty-seven miles in width. Lake Texcoco, a large body of water lying immediately to the east of the City of Mexico, is only six feet higher than the level of the street pavements. In 1593 this lake rose and inundated the city, drowning thousands of the inhabitants. The waters of the lake covered the site of the city to a depth of three feet and remained so for over four years. This danger is now obviated by a great drainage canal.
