COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS.

Harrison, Nebr. Dec. 27, 1904. Board of county commissioners met pursuant to adjournment... On motion it is ordered that the road petitioned for by Patrick Lacy and others be allowed and declared a public road... On motion the county treasurer is instructed to refund to A. Knori \$2.70 amount of taxes paid under protest... The following official bonds were taken up and on motion were approved... J. H. Newlin, justice of the peace Bowen precinct... John Mesley, justice of the peace Sugar Loaf precinct... Michael J. O'Connell county attorney... Daniel Slattery road overseer Warbonnet precinct... John Wasserburger road overseer Sugar Loaf precinct... William Miller road overseer Hat creek precinct... Ezra Tucker road overseer Andrews precinct... The road petition of James Stoneking and others was taken up and by an agreement entered into between Wm. J. A. Raum in behalf of the petitioners and H. S. Parks in behalf of the remonstrators whereby the differences were to be adjusted and all former petitions and remonstrances were to be withdrawn and a new petition circulated by said Raum and Parks adjusting the differences between them satisfactory to all concerned... Board adjourned to Dec. 28... Harrison, Nebr. Dec. 28, 1904. County board met pursuant to adjournment. Present, Bigelow, Jordan, Cullers and clerk.

The road petition of L. W. Crane was taken up and after due examination it appearing to be a consent road and so declared by each signer of petition the road was declared allowed and road overseer instructed to open and work said newly established road... Taxes of \$29.09 paid under protest by Henry Warnke in 1902 was taken up and on investigation was found same property was assessed in Bowen and Warbonnet precincts and on motion the county treasurer is hereby authorized to refund to said Warnke the amount above stated... Petition for bridge across Cottonwood creek by R. C. Talley and others laid over until next meeting... Petition for bridges on the new road petitioned for by P. Lacy and others was laid over until next meeting... On motion the county treasurer be and is hereby instructed to transfer the bond money of school district No. 16, now in county treasurer's hands, to school district fund, district No. 26... The official bond of M. J. Weber was taken up and on motion was approved... On motion the treasurer is instructed to transfer \$1000.00 from bridge fund of 1904 to general fund of 1904... The claim of J. J. Henry for poll taxes paid for 1902 was taken up and on investigation was found that said Henry worked his poll tax in South Dakota in 1902 and clerk instructed to issue warrant on road Dist. No. 8... On motion the county treasurer was instructed to refund to the estate of E. Downey the sum of \$15.65 taxes paid under protest, account property was not assessable in a school district in White River precinct...
