Harrison, Nebr., Jan. 10, 1905.
 Board of county commissioners met in regular session. Present Jordan, Cullers, Bigelow and clerk.

The road petition from Henry Parks by J. E. Porter was ordered returned to said J. E. Porter on account of no deposit accompanying said petition and not legally filed.

The official bonds of Cliton Metz as justice of the peace in Cottonwood precinct, Henry Kreman as road overseer district No. 11, and Jacob Wasserburger road overseer Dist. No. 1 were taken up and on motion were approved.
 On motion the treasurer was and is hereby instructed to transfer \$29 19 from road district No. 1 to special road Dist. No. 1, \$11 92 from road district No. 2 to special road district No. 2, \$22 85 and from road district No. 3 to special road district No. 3, \$3 54 from road district No. 4 to special road district No. 4.
 On account of a part of road district No. 5 being thrown into road district No. 9 the Treasurer is instructed to transfer \$8 94 from special road district No. 5 to special road district No. 9, and from road district 5 to special road district No. 4 \$7 32, from road district 6 to special district No. 4 25 cts., road district 7 to special road district 4 \$5 79 and from special road district 5 to special road district 4 \$25 00 and from special road district 6 to special road district 4 \$1 03, from special road district 7 to special road district 4 \$26 53. Above transfers were made on account of road district 4 being comprised of districts 4, 5, 6, and 7. From road district 8 to special road Dist. \$10 84, from road district 11 to special road district 11 \$31 79, road district 12 to special road district 12 \$40 55.
