APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE. (Ordinance No. 53.) An ordinance relative to levying a tax on the taxable property, both real and personal, of the village of Loup City, Nebraska, to provide for the necessary expenses of the said village for the fiscal year of 1897, etc. Be it ordained by the chairman and board of trustees of the said village of Loup City, Nebraska: Section 1. That there be and is hereby levied on the taxable property, both real and personal, within the village of Loup City, Nebraska, for the various funds herein after named, the tax after such respective funds, to-wit: General fund, 10 mills.
