The Ohio Republicans meet Tuesday in State Convention and re-nominated Governor Bushnell and placed a full state ticket in the field.

A treaty to annex Hawaii to the United States is nearly at the point of consummation. The treaty has already received the signature of the president and is now awaiting the confirmation of the senate.

Democrats and populists are becoming more and more convinced that the tariff is an issue. They were told this last fall but were either too blind to see it or else they didn't want to. Perhaps they were afflicted with both diseases.

We have received this week a sample copy of the Washington News Letter. A newsy and instructive paper published at the National Capital. The News is accompanied with a handsome supplement containing the photo of Nebraska's much esteemed senator John M. Thurston.

The village board has ordered the street commissioner of the village to notify all parties having defective sidewalks to repair the same at once. There are many places in town where sidewalks are in a bad condition and this move on the part of our city aldermen will meet with the approval of the citizens.

A great many have commenced irrigating their gardens again. The late rains, however, has placed everything in a thriving condition and irrigation is not exactly necessary but it seems that there are those who like to see the water run. A liberal use of water around trees and small fruits will do much good though, and it is gratifying to see these advantages utilized in that direction.

A tornado which passed over the central and southern portion of Logan county last Friday afternoon destroyed thousands of dollars worth of property and completely demolished the immense cow barn on the farm of the state institution for the feeble minded. Twenty-six persons seeking refuge were buried in the debris. Four of the refugees, boy pupils from Chicago, were taken out dead. Five others were severely injured.

"You cannot legislate value into anything cried the average gold bug last fall. But some of these same croakers are already beginning to find out that sugar and tea are now beginning to cost more because there is a likelihood of the law doing something with them under the tariff bill that is under discussion."

The above item we clip from the Old Journal and is a fair sample of the sort which is being published weekly in that and other populist Journals. Sugar is being sold in Loup City 20 lbs for a dollar, and tea is being advertised at from 15 cents up. Coffee is sold 2 packages for a quarter. Just why "Cliff" of the Journal should indulge in such frivolous remarks is beyond our ability to comprehend, unless it be that he really obtains from the use of these articles as a beverage and has so crowded his thoughts in the use of the alkali water of the North Loup Valley that he has already sunk to the bottom three times and failed to come to the top. It reminds one of a drowning man grasping at a straw.

The Kearney Sun says: "The closing day of the League meeting was full of interest as indeed was the entire meeting, and when the hour of adjournment came it was with reluctance that delegates separated. The program for Sunday was an especially strong one and every meeting was greeted with a large audience. The opera house was engaged for the convention sermons by Chancellor McDowell, of Denver, and even that building was filled to standing room only. Those who attended heard one of the ablest sermons ever preached in the city. At the business meeting Saturday afternoon the following officers were elected for the coming year: S. A. D. Henline, president; Miss Mamie Horner, Lexington, first vice-president; Mr. A. G. Hoffman, Arnold; second vice-president; Mrs. E. E. Daves, Cozad, third vice-president; Mrs. McMullen, Burwell, fourth vice-president; Mr. Walter Ware, Loup City, corresponding secretary; Miss Kate Majors, Kearney, secretary; H. Lomax, Broken Bow, treasurer; Mrs. Koffman, Gothenburg, superintendent junior league work. The fifth annual meeting will be held at Loup City, next year. The Methodist people of this city can well congratulate themselves for the success that crowned their efforts to entertain the convention.

Phinx Mosher has spoken. He says that he lost over \$400,000 gambling in stocks and grain. If he has spoken truly the Lincoln people who lost by the Capital National failure have the satisfaction of knowing where their money went. The statements were made on the witness stand and in cross-examination. The statement of the losses is made with particularity and names of the firms dealt with are given. Wednesday and Thursday the bank wrecker was before a notary in the Auditorium annex in Chicago answering questions put by Lincoln lawyers. More exact information about the failure of the Capital National bank and about the Mosher system of bookkeeping was forthcoming than has been drawn out at any other of the numerous trials growing out of the failure.—State Journal.

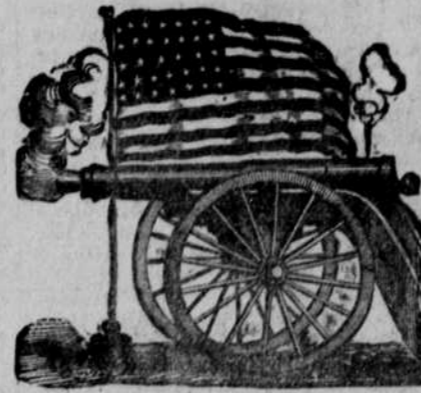
