The Ohio democrats convention is on, having assembled Wednesday. There are even twenty candidates for the nomination of governor.

We have received the initial number of the Midland Union a monthly published in the interest of irrigation. It is published at Gothenburg Nebraska and contained some very fine photographic views of the formers and merchants irrigating canal of Lexington Nebraska.

Bartley the defaulting ex-state treasurer has been tried in the district court of Douglas county and convicted of embezzling \$150,000 for which he was sentenced to twenty years in the penitentiary at hard labor and fined a sum double the amount imbezzled. He was sentenced by a republican court and prosecuted by a republican prosecuting attorney. The sentence is also concurred in by the republican press of the state. No decenting opinion has been written. Bartley has mapped out his own route and must follow it. He has administered his own medicine and must take the consequences.

July 13th 14th and 15th is the date set for the convention of the National Republican League to be held at Detroit Michigan. Every arrangement is being made by the organization to have a harmonious meeting. The National Republican League is now ten years old and, aided by the State League organizations has been one of the greatest institutions ever inaugurated by the party in helping to achieve the grand victory won last fall. At this meeting a place will be selected to hold the National Republican convention in 1900. Detroit, Baltimore, Dallas, San Francisco, Omaha, Fargo and Indianapolis are prominently advocated as suitable places for the great conclave. Senator John M. Thurston and Charles E. Smith have accepted invitations to address the League convention. The Nebraska state League is in good working order and all subordinate clubs should be active in assisting to carry on the good work. Every republican can help by taking an interest in their local organization and assist in furnishing information that will be effective and valuable.

It may be observed by a perusal of the Times-Independent that the populist judges on the district court benches, and especially for Sherman county, are making more orders for sheriff sale notice than any other republican judge we ever had. It will also be remembered that these same fellows stumped the district and pledged themselves to stand by the people in this matter of protecting their homes. There has been more orders of sheriffs sales under the populist administration than has ever been under the republican judgment in this district, almost two to one. All the organs of mugwump persuasion declare now that a populist judge cannot help it. Why then did't they tell the people so when the campaign was on; they knew it then as well as they know it now. All of the populist judges who have held the position are old experienced lawyers and were familiar with all such cases. The fact is they cannot administer justice and keep these pledges. This furnishes them some excuse for going back on their word but they have no excuse for having made such pledges in the first place. It was simply done to fool the people, and fool the people they did.

SUPERVISORS PROCEEDINGS.

State of Nebraska, Sherman County, Loup City Nebraska, June 14, 1897. Be it remembered that at an adjoining session of the county board of supervisors of said county, held pursuant to adjournment of March 5, 1897, on this 14th day of June, 1897, at the court house in Loup City, in said county and state, the full board being present the following among other proceeds was had and done, to-wit:

Minutes of previous meeting were read and on motion approved as read. After reducing the number of cattle from 5 to 3 as assessed to Frank Albin in 1893 and the clerk being ordered to make changes on assessor's books, the board proceeded to consider the bid filed by W. T. Gibson, for the erection of a wagon bridge across Oak Creek, on section one, town 14, range 13 on county line, no other bids for the construction of said bridge having been filed. The plans and specifications and bid of said W. T. Gibson were accepted and contracted and bond ordered drawn provided Howard county agrees to pay half the expense of building said bridge.

The chairman having heretofore approved the official bonds of James Wm. Gowin, as road overseer, Dist. 25 and Wm. Gornett overseer road Dist. 24 said bonds were then examined by the county board and on motion approved and the action of the chairman in approving said bonds was ratified and confirmed.

The following official bonds were examined by the county board and approved and approval endorsed thereon by the Chairman, to-wit: Sidney C. Hollister, road overseer Dist. 22, Geo. B. Work, treasurer of Scott township and E. V. Ferguson, constable of Harrison township.

Bond of James W. Johnson as overseer of roads in Dist. 3, was not approved and order referred to said Johnson to supply proper certificate showing the appointment by the town board of said Johnson to the said office.

A Communication from the clerk of Howard county, asking the co-operation of Sherman county, in the construction of a bridge on county line on the west line of M. Goffa's farm (S. W. 1/4-6-15-12) was read, and the board having duly considered said communication it was on motion resolved that Sherman county do not co-operate in the construction of said bridge for the reason that the construction is not properly a charge on Sherman county, but said bridge should be constructed by Howard county in co-operation with Ashton township.

The petition signed by C. W. Fletcher et al., asking for a bridge across Rock Creek was allowed and supervisor Dunker instructed to build a low water bridge across said creek.

Board adjourned to June 19, 1897 Attest, Louis Rein, County Clerk June 15, 16, and 17, were passed in considering matters of equalization.

June 18 1897 Full Board in Session.

The board found that the average price per head of the whole county, of horses, cattle and mules as compiled by the board from the return of the assessors of the townships in the county to be as follows, for the year 1897:

Horses, \$4.50 per head
Cattle, 3.53
Mules, 4.60

State of Nebraska, Sherman County, Loup City, June 19 1897

Be it remembered that the county board of supervisors of said county was in session this 19, day of June 1897 at 9 o'clock A. M. of said day at the court house in Loup City, sitting as the board of equalization of assessments pursuant to adjournment of June 17, 1897. Present J. P. Leineger Chairman and all the members of said board. This day was taken up in the equalization of personal and land tax, and the total assessed value of the assessable property of the county as equalized was found to be \$49,067.32

On motion the following levies were made for 1897: For county general fund 2 1/2 mills, county road 1/2 mill, refunding bond interest fund 1/2 mill, old refunding bond interest 1 mill, bridge bond interest 2 mills, O. and R. V. R. R. bond interest 3 mills. Total 23 mills. On motion it is ordered that a sufficient amount be levied to pay the judgments of the F. C. Austin manufacturing company against Elm township, and the county clerk is instructed to make necessary computations.

The levies made for Washington Webster, Loup City, Ashton, Rockville, Scott and Bristol township were made to conform with the certificates of the townships levies filed by said township with the county clerk, the levy for Oak Creek, Logan, Elm, Clay, Harrison, and Hazard townships were not conformed with the certificates of the levies filed by said township but were ordered made by the county board, no certificate having been filed by Clay and Elm township, and the county board having decided to keep the aggregate of the county and township levies within the sum of 13 mills, and said townships, to-wit: Oak

Creek, Hazard, Harrison, Logan having filed with the county clerk certificates of township levies showing township levies, which added to the county levy, exclusive of county board interest levy, would make the aggregate levy more than 15 mills

The following levies were ordered made for village levies conforming with the certificates filed with the county clerk:

Loup City, general fund 10 mills, water bond street 2, judgement 18 mills, water bond 23 mills, total 63 mills. Rockville, general fund 3 mills, total 3 mills.

On motion the county clerk is instructed to levy upon the taxable property of Ashton, Litchfield, and Hazard the amounts that may be testified to by the proper village officers.

On motion the county clerk is instructed to levy upon the taxable property of the school districts in Sherman county, having bonded indebtedness, amount sufficient to pay interest on said bonded indebtedness and create sinking fund for the payment of said bonded debt, the clerk to make the necessary computations, and the clerk is further instructed to levy upon the taxable property of the school districts of Sherman county the amount certified to him by the school officers of the various school districts in the manner provided by law.

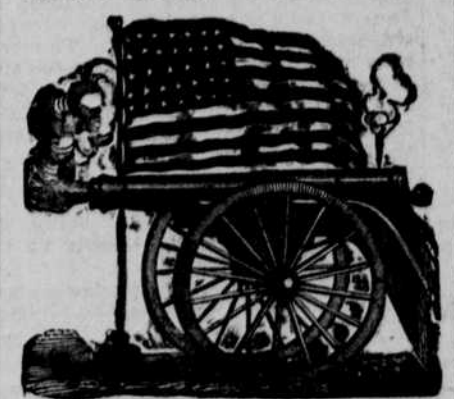
The board adjourned as a board of equalization since die.

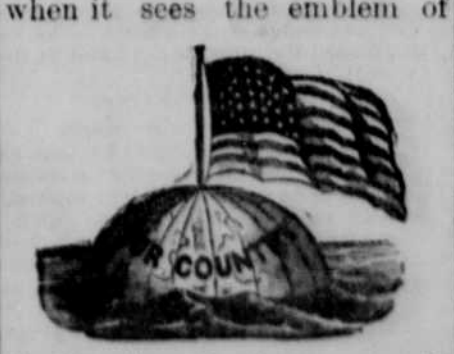
