The indications are that the rise in wheat has been entirely independent of rings and cliques, that there is no syndicate behind the bull movement and that the cereal has gone up to a dollar and more a bushel to stay. Short crops all over the world fully account for the phenomenal buoyancy of the grain market. When wheat gets to a dollar and a quarter the demand will be checked by the dearthness of this particular breadstuff, and the working people of Europe will begin to ask for cheaper food. Then corn will begin to jump until it has reached a figure expressing its comparative value as food to wheat. One dollar and twenty-five-cent wheat eventually means 50-cent corn.—State Journal.

Three years ago a cry for bread was going up from thousands of Nebraska homes. Disaster and despair hung like a black cloud over once smiling valleys and we thankfully accepted the donations of food and clothing sent to us from all quarters of the nation. It was pitiful. 
