The west side pop, whose letter appears in another column of this paper, in answer to the letter of the east side pop has seen fit to bring the NORTHWESTERN into the controversy, because we at one time saw fit to make favorable mention of Mr. Badura as a candidate. In making such comment we had no intention at the time of supporting Mr. Badura, but only spoke of him as being a good man who should command his party vote. The letter brings us to task because we stated that Mr. Badura has extensive interests here. So we understood it at the time, but if Mr. West Side is correct in his statement that Badura's interests are in York State, we will have to take it back. So far as John Minshull is concerned we have not made any editorial attack upon him, except a few line comment on the letter written by Mr. East Side, regarding his being able to hold on to an office after once getting possession. Our business relations with John while he was a member of the county board have always been pleasant.

If the east and west side populists cannot agree, that is their own fault, and if they choose to use these columns to state the case to the people we will grant them what little space we have to spare.

We stop the press to announce the result of the republican county convention which was held this afternoon in the Walworth hall, and also to say that the candidates are all competent, honest and well qualified for the respective position for which they have been chosen: For Clerk, John Hopper; Treasurer, Geo. Newberg, Judge, E. Munn, Sheriff, D. Ormsbee; Supt. Mrs. A. J. Kearns; Coroner, Mrs. Mary K. Hendrickson; Surveyor, Walter Moon.

The Times said last week, "the idea of a populist writing a letter for publication in a republican paper." We ask, is it any more strange that they should do so than it is for populists to quit their subscription to the Times and subscribe for the NORTHWESTERN? Such has been the case in many instances. But Brown himself has made even more radical changes than that; he has been known to change his politics in one day.

The democratic and populist conventions of Buffalo county were held last week both on the same day with a view to fusion. They failed to fuse, however, and each convention put a full county ticket in the field. The Ravenna News a pop-ocratic fusionist organ says that the split up is liable to result in the election of the entire republican county ticket.

The republican judicial convention was held at Ravenna yesterday and resulted in the nomination of Simon Cameron, of Broken Bow. The convention first named Judge Gasin but the Judge declined the nomination. The nominee, Mr. Cameron is a man of large experience and ability and will carry the full republican strength.

Just What We Want.

Yes, dear democratic friends, the tariff will increase the cost of living. It has already done so. Wheat is higher, corn, hogs, cattle and all food productions are higher than they were. No matter how cheap the cost of living to men who are out of work. If bread is only a cent a loaf their children must cry for bread unless they have the cent to buy it with. No wages mean no loaves of bread per day, even when bread is a penny a loaf, but two dollars a day means 40 loaves of bread a day even at five cents per loaf.— York Times.

There is sadness in home of Mr. Paulsen, living near Virdugette, this county occasioned by the burning of a large frame barn in which was burned to death their little four year old daughter and four head of horses. The fire occurred last Tuesday about noon and while Mr. Paulsen was away at Litchfield. Just how the fire originated we have not learned but it is reported that several children, members of the family were playing in the loft at the time the fire broke out, and all but the little girl escaped. She ran to the open door as if to escape but being a child to jump and frightened and bewildered ran back into the flames which had gained such headway that it was impossible to save her. The mother and other children were horrified at the awful situation. As soon as help could be summoned the child was

taken out. The body was burned to a crisp and both arms and one leg was nearly reduced to ashes.

EDITOR NORTHWESTERN:

Having read the open letter to John Minshull in your paper of two weeks ago and written by a pretended friend of the populist party, who signs himself an "East Side Pop" I would thank you for a little space in which to reply.
