ELECTION NOTE
 The returns from Sherman county are all in but with the exception of Loup City township the vote is much lighter than it was last year. The returns of the county show that Sullivan has a majority over Post in the county of 321 or in other words Sullivan gets 754 and Post 433. The latest returns from the state indicate a majority for the fusionists of from 8,000 to 12,000 nearly a half less than that of last year.

The county ticket was carried by the pops by majorities from 99 to 405. Mrs. Kearns for Superintendent led the republican ticket with John Hopper for clerk a close second. Both candidates carried their own township by a large majority and Mrs. Kearns even carried her opponents home township which gave a populist majority for the rest of the ticket.

One republican supervisor has been saved out of the wreck and the republicans are talking of heading the state ticket with him next fall. This successful candidate is Lewis Bechtold of Loup City township and his very name seems to be an eye sore to fusion. Two years ago he loomed up against one of our best business men and came out on top; last Tuesday he made the race against one of his brother farmers and beat his former record, doubling his majority and coming out with open daylight in the lead on the home stretch. Surely Mr. Bechtold should either be placed at the head of the ticket or be pitted against J. M. Snyder in his race for the senate next fall.

John Minshall for clerk of the populist ticket received 22 less votes in Oak Creek and Ashton townships than Mr. Badura but John's home precincts came to his rescue and piled him up nice little majorities which landed him safely with votes to spare.

Sherman county gives H. M. Sullivan for district judge 308 majority and it is safe to say that he is elected by a very handsome majority, but up to the hour of going to press returns of the other counties have not been reported.

Both Buffalo and Valley counties have elected the entire republican county ticket.

Republican gains are reported in some of the populist strong holds of the state, and also that the populist have made slight gains in some of the republican strong holds.

In other populist states the republicans have made large gains. Returns from South Dakota show that out of eight circuit judges the republicans elected six.

Ohio and the other republican states are safe and Mark Hanna will be returned to the senate.

It is amusing to hear of some few republicans who train with the pops, taking people into the back rooms of their office and pulling them into the alleys and telling them that the NORTHWESTERN is responsible for the defeat of the republican ticket in Sherman county. It was the NORTHWESTERN, together with the aid of true blue republicans that reduced the majority of Minshall's from that of Rehn's about one half, Rehn's majority being 202 and Minshall's only 130, and the vote on superintendent this year was reduced nearly two-thirds. These mugwumps have it in for us because we dared to ask for the post office and are systematically holding street alley

consultations and furnishing food for pop leaders and pop papers and their half dozen republican palls for the purpose of working up prejudice in the republican party against us. They have been known to do wire pulling at pop conventions and work and vote for pop candidates. They train with the pops and it is believed they invariably vote the pop ticket.

It was quite evident that both of the long articles published in the Times Independent and Monitor regarding Mrs. Kearns' candidacy were penned by the same person. The fact that both were written on the same line of thought from start to finish makes it plain that it has been necessary for a more abler pen pusher than either Brown or Thompson to turn up a plausible story to counteract some of the substantial arguments made in that lady's favor. If Brown and Thompson were able to do their own writing the editorials would doubtless have more weight and the two papers would not be so much of a sameness.

All a candidate has to do in Sherman county to be elected is to scrap hard enough in the convention to secure a nomination on the pop ticket.
