We notice John Johnson is back from his trip to northern Minnesota, and Wisconsin. He reports having a very nice time, but thinks Nebraska is all right yet for him.

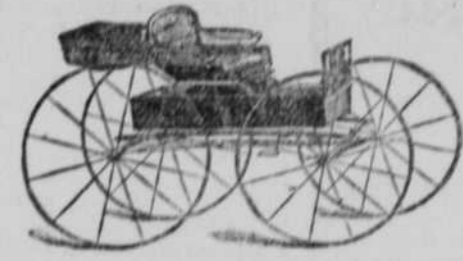

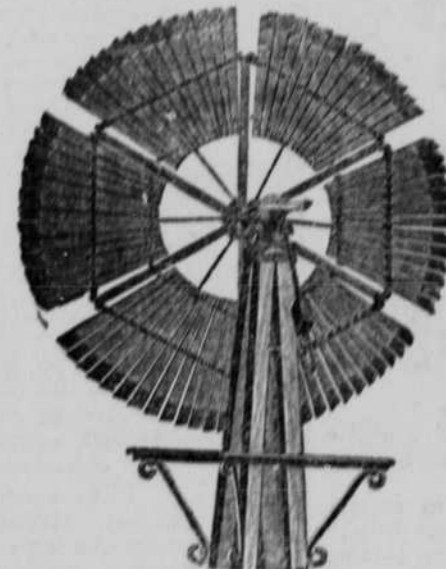
