The Times made no defense of Mr. Miller, the candidate for senator on the populist ticket in his desperate and dishonest means which he employed to capture the democratic vote of this county. Its only reply was that M. C. Mulick was the person who tried to procure a copy of the Ravenna News instead of John O'Neil, and thereby practically admitted that he had destroyed the exchange. He also further states that Mr. Mulick styles himself as the democratic party in this county. This is not so, Mr. Mulick only claims to be one of that party but like the rest of them is not willing to be swallowed by a lot of fusion pap-suckers. Regarding John O'Neil's situation it is pretty plain that John, too, was decoyed into that meeting by the Buffalo county hoodlums, who by a thorough understanding with the populists was instrumental in carrying out the scheme. When the democratic vote of this county is piled upon the Times man will be convinced that while Mr. Mulick is not the democratic party, yet he is one of its most influential members.

GOVERNOR HOLCOMB AT LOUP CITY.

Last Saturday Governor Holcomb spoke at the opera house in this city. The meeting was well advertised but to the discredit of the people, and particularly the populists only an audience of a few women and children and 24 voters was present to greet him. When he commenced his speech there were by actual count 19 voters in the large hall, when he closed there were 24. This included seven republicans, two pop candidates, chairman of the pop state central committee, chairman of the pop county committee, pop county attorney and the Governor himself.

The Governor started out by telling the audience not to feel bad on account of the small attendance. That it would afford the republicans a chance to tell the truth once because they would have reported a small audience anyway, but the people would consider the source and brand it as a lie. From that he drifted off on the Bartley default and a general abuse of the republican party and its candidates. He kept shouting thieves until the chairman of the meeting H. M. Mathew actually blushed. Not one of the court house fellows except county attorney Long lent their presence to the occasion, even the pop editor was conspicuous for his absence although he was in the city and knew the way to the opera house; at least he has been seen there when a comedy company has billed the town. There was nothing new about Mr. Holcomb's speech. It was the same stereotyped calamity dodger that you read about in the pop papers every day. He admits having bought oleomargarine to feed the blind, the deaf and dumb but said it was a great saving to the state.

Governor Holcomb came to Loup City under what certainly must have been for him, trying circumstances. No preparation was made by the pop officials for his reception although he telephoned across from Litchfield two hours and a half before his arrival. The pops made no arrangements to have him brought from Litchfield, and Mr. Flint a good republican, was coming over and the Governor came with him. The next morning he was allowed to wander off to the depot alone, not one of his party showing respect enough for our chief executive to escort him to the train. The Governor must have felt like shaking the dust of Loup City from his feet. He acknowledged to Mr. Flint, that the country was prosperous and further that he believed we had the most prosperous country to-day on the face of the globe. The republicans here feel much chagrined that our governor should be treated with such little respect by his own party. It smacks to much of anarchy and had they known that such would have been the case a republican escort would have been furnished for him. We would of tried to make him feel at home while in our midst. If the populists have no respect for their officers they should respect the office.

HOW MILLER FUSED.

The Loup City Northwestern gives the history of how Uncle Jimmie Miller was nominated as a democrat at that place last week. Buffalo county was represented by C. B. Scott, Judge Sullivan's Court reporter, L. B. Fenner, an attache of the Industrial school, and Mr. Osborne of Ravenna. An effort was made by these men to get Loup City democrats to join them in holding a convention but the task was too great and it was abandoned. They then went into convention with Mr. Miller's pop representatives as delegates.

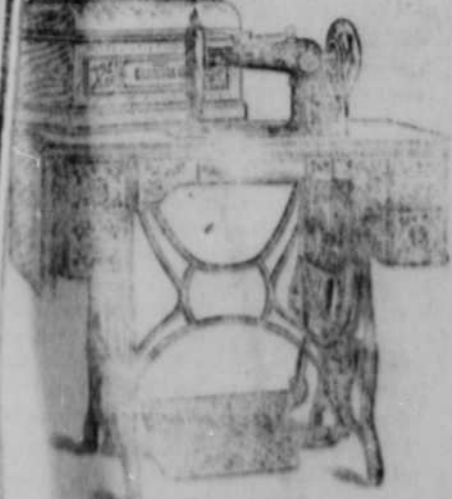
