TREATISE ON HAWAIIAN ISLANDS.

Union Pacific Publishes a Book on Uncle Sam's New Possessions.

The Union Pacific has just issued one of the most interesting and artistic publications in the way of a railroad compendium of information ever placed before the public. Though in the shape of a folder, it is really an elaborate treatise on the Hawaiian islands. The title page is an ingeniously wrought design, showing the Pacific ocean surrounding the Hawaiian archipelago, bearing a ship of the vintage of 1778 with a mariner on the quarter deck. It represents the discovery of the islands by Captain Cook. Blended with the whole are scenes of more modern periods, the palace of the new republic with the stars and stripes prominently in evidence and other features of historic moment. The illustrations, of which there are more than 100, present the finest skill of the photographic artist. They are executed in the color process, and excel any views of scenery ever shown in this way. These illustrations depict every phase of native life, historic spots, public buildings, Hawaiian scenery, etc., but they are of secondary consideration as compared with the valuable information about the islands which the publication contains. The geographical, historical, agricultural and educational features are fully dealt with, while the manufacturing and industrial resources of the territory are especially prominent. Though the publication is elaborate and exhaustive it is so tabulated that every conceivable subject relating to the island is presented in such a manner as to make an interesting story of the whole.

The work begins with the discovery of the island by the bold Cook and adventurous mates, later intercourse with the people, their history as a nation, sketches of their rulers and men of note, forms of government, ancient and modern, the prevailing methods of agriculture, commerce of the various nations with the islands, educational institutions, showing the natives to be rapidly advancing, and concludes with some interesting observations on the evolution from monarchical to republican form of government. While the frontispiece is a delicately designed affair and a thing of beauty, the final illustration, showing a tropical begonia and a typical private residence of Honolulu, is a triumph of the artistic features.

A considerable portion of the passenger traffic of the United States to these new possessions must pass through the Missouri river gateway, and General Passenger Agent Lomax of the Union Pacific has presented this folder to the public for the benefit of those who desire accurate and exhaustive information on the subject.—Omaha Bee.

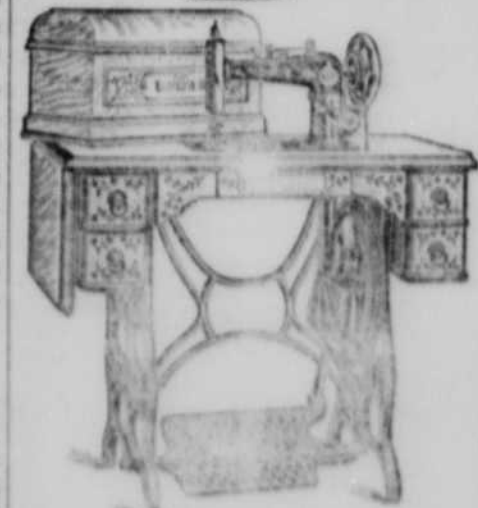
