LEMON SOUFFLE PUDDING—The grated rind and juice of 2 lemons, 1 qt of water, 1/2 cup of butter, 2 cups of sugar, 5 eggs. Boil the water, lemon, butter and sugar together dissolve 4 table-spoons cornstarch, stir into the boiling syrup, separate the eggs, beat the yolks smooth, stir them into the mixture, remove from the fire, beat the whites to a stiff froth, beat them into cream mixture, take cups, fill about half full set them into a pan of hot water, place in the oven and bake about 10 minutes or until it puffs up nicely, serve in the same dish. These kinds of puddings must not get cold or they will fall, if you put them into the oven when you set down to dinner they will be ready for desert in time.

FRENCH POACHED EGGS—Take 1 qt. of milk, butter the size of a large hen egg, pepper and salt to taste, put the milk, butter, salt and pepper in a stew pan, set the stew pan in a kettle of hot water until boiling hot, beat up 12 eggs just so they are nicely broken together stir them into the milk and let them cook about 30 minutes. Good for supper on slices of toast.

PEACH FLAN—Used for desert or sweet entree. Line a deep square pan with a good pie paste, peel nice ripe peaches, slice and cover the bottom about two layers thick, sprinkle some sugar over them, make a custard with a quart of milk, 8 eggs, 4 table-spoons of sugar, pour over the peaches and bake in a slow oven. You can rise canned peaches as well but drain well before using.

BAKED COCOANUT PUDDING—2 qts. of milk, 6 oz. cocoanut, 6 eggs, 6 oz of sugar, 2 tea-spoonsful of corn starch dissolved in a little cold milk, 2 oz. butter. Boil milk, cocoanut, butter and sugar together, add corn-starch, remove from fire, beat the eggs well add to the other ingredients, after cooling a little bake from 25 to 30 minutes. Flavor with lemon.

BREAKFAST STEW—Take the piece of cold roast left over, cut up in dice form, add some potatoes cut in dice, a small onion, pepper and salt to taste, a piece of butter, stew all together, thicken a little with flour rubbed smooth with a little cold water.

Corned beef stewed with potatoes for supper or breakfast. Take the cold corn-beef left from dinner cut up in dice form add some potatoes cut the same way, a small onion cut fine, a piece of butter, salt and pepper to taste, stew till done, thicken a little and serve. Good enough for the best.

LEMON HONEY FOR CAKES, TARTS ETC. Grate the outside and squeeze the juice of two lemons, add 1 cup of sugar, 1/2 cup of butter, yolks of three eggs, place over the fire stirring all the time till it forms a jelly which will be in about ten minutes.

APPLE JELLY FOR CAKES—Grate two moderate sized tart apples, add the rind and juice of one lemon and one cup of sugar, boil three minutes.

MAGNOLIA MERINQUE—Make a plain cake mixture say 5 eggs, 1 cup of sugar, 1/2 cup of butter, 1/2 cup milk, 2 cups flour 1 tea-spoonful baking powder, bake in a sheet 1/2 inch thick of light color, make the pastry cream a little stiffer than for pies, spread on top of the sheet of cake about 3-4 inch thick, beat the whites of eggs left from making the cream to a stiff froth, add two table-spoons of white sugar to the white of one egg, place the frosting on top of the cream, sprinkle over with sugar and place in the oven about ten minutes until a light straw color.
