The Union Passenger station at Chicago has long enjoyed a world beating record for freedom from accidents and the correctness with which baggage is handled. The report for 1898 just to hand contains the following interesting statement: "There were handled 7,500,000 passengers without accident, and \$50,000,000 worth of baggage without the loss of a single piece. This is the third successive year in which there has been no claim for lost baggage of any kind at this station." The Pennsylvania, Chicago and Altoona, Burlington and Milwaukee railroads are the lines whose trains run into and out of this station.

**MANILA, LETTER.**

MANILA, P. I. Feb. 23, 1899.

DEAR MOTHER AND FATHER—I seat myself to answer your ever kind and welcome letter. I was glad to hear that you were all well. I have not written for some time as I have been sick and in the hospital, but am getting pretty well again. I suppose you have heard all about the fighting over here. The Insurgents took the initiative and opened the ball, I have not had a chance to take a hand yet but hope I will be able to use my gun before long. I have got two letters from you since I wrote last, and I had got two at that time so you can see the mail comes in bunches, I expect to get some more in a few days. There was a transport came in with some more troops a few days ago, we understood that they were to relieve us, but I do not expect to get away here until this thing is settled with the natives. There was not very many of our men killed but the natives suffered a heavy loss. They do not know how to shoot and thousands of them were killed. I have not heard how many were killed on our side but I think there was about 70. Well mother I wish I could be with you and get something good to eat but I have been away so long that the cooking does not bother me any more. It does not matter to me; whether the grub is cooked or not that is the way we live in the army. But I hope we will get home before long. I will try and write as often as I can but I cannot write regular, Well I must close hoping to hear from you soon. With best wishes I am Your affectionate son.
