The First Nebraska boys are expected to reach San Francisco about July 10th, and home during the latter part of the month.

There are now four Polar expedition ready to start for the frozen north and a fifth is under headway in France, each one determined to bring back a section of the north pole.

Mrs. Anna Gould Castellane headed a riotous mob last week in an attack on President Loubet of France. Of course Uncle Sam will not be considered responsible for the actions of this, his former subjects as she acquired the French brand of lunacy after marrying an obsolete French title.
