THURSDAY, APRIL 13th, 1900, AT 2 P M for the purpose of electing 3 delegates to the state convention to be held in the city of Lincoln, on May 2; also to elect 2 delegates to the congressional convention for the sixth congressional district and further to elect a county central committee and to transact such other business as may properly and lawfully come before said convention.

The several townships are entitled to representation as follows: The apportionment being based upon the vote cast for Hon. Manoah B. Reese, in 1896, giving each township one delegate at large and one for every ten votes and fraction thereof.
