DIED.

Darius Reynolds, an old and widely known former citizen of this county departed this life on December 26, 1900 at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. L. Conbiser, at Sargent, Neb. His death was sudden and was caused by taking Wood alcohol.

At about 11 o'clock on the morning of the 26th inst. his son, S. F. Reynolds received a telegram informing him of the sudden sickness of his father and took the noon train to go at once. He arrived to late, however, to see his father alive. The following Thursday morning his remains were brought to Loup City and will be laid to rest beside his wife who died here and was buried in the Sunny Slope cemetery, west of town, some eighteen years ago.

Mr. Reynolds was born in New York State, May 5th, 1824 and was 76 years, 7 months, and 22 days old. He came to Loup City in 1873 and was among the oldest settlers, and was one of the first to take up a homestead in Sherman county. There was a large crowd at the train, to pay their respects to the departed.

The funeral and burial will take place this morning at 10 o'clock. The bereaved relatives have the sympathy of all.
