Whereas: Certain rumors are current in Valley and Sherman counties in regard to the killing of one Frank Landa in Sherman county, in the year 1894, which tend to connect Frank Manchester and David Ingraham with the commission of the crime, and

Whereas: These rumors have been traced back to their origin, and are found to spring out of a conversation had between Mrs. Aleck Smith and myself, and

Whereas: Mrs. Smith evidently misunderstood what was said by me; Therefore: In order to remove any possible injury to the good name of David Ingraham and Frank Manchester, I wish to state that I have no knowledge of any facts which would in any manner tend to implicate either of the above named persons in the commission of said crime; and that such rumors are without foundation and wholly unjust, and I hope that no one will give any credence to them. And I desire that this statement of mine may be given the utmost publicity so as to remove any cloud that may overshadow the reputation or character of either David Ingraham or Frank Manchester, and cause pain to their relatives and friends by reason of such unjust suspicions and aspersions as the above rumors have a tendency to create.

SUPERVISOR'S PROCEEDINGS

Loup City, Neb. June 15, 1901. Pursuant to adjournment of June 14, 1901 the county board of Supervisors were in session at the court house in Loup City, sitting as a board of equalization, present W. C. Dietrich, Chairman, and all members of the board, also John Minshull, Clerk, and the following proceedings were had and done, to-wit:

The county board found that the average price per head for the whole county on stock is as follows:

Horses—\$4.50
Cattle—3.84
Mules—5.05
Sheep—.35

Oak Creek—Horses 4.59, 3 1/2 per cent deducted; cattle 4.42, 13 1/2 per cent added; mules 4.25, 19 per cent added.

Logan—Horses 4.65, 2 1/2 per cent deducted; cattle 3.88 2-3 per cent deducted; mules 3.85, 31 per cent added; sheep 30, 17 per cent added.

Washington—Horses 4.57, 3 1/2 per cent deducted; cattle 3.72, 3 per cent added; mules 4.33, 17 per cent added.

Elm—Horses 4.21, 8 per cent added; cattle 3.40, 13 per cent added; mules 4.83, 22 per cent added.

Webster—Horses 4.25, 7 per cent added; cattle 3.55, 8 per cent added; mules 3.70, 58 per cent added; sheep 50, 30 per cent deducted.

Loup City—Horses 4.92, 7 3/4 per cent deducted; cattle 3.45, 11 per cent added; mules 5.58, 14 per cent deducted; sheep 42, 17 per cent deducted.

Ashton—Horses 5.00, 9 per cent deducted; cattle 3.37, 14 per cent added; mules 5.00, 1 per cent added; sheep 1.00, 55 per cent deducted.

Rockville—Horses 4.17, 9 per cent added; cattle 4.32, 11 1/2 per cent deducted; mules 5.43, 5 1/4 per cent deducted; sheep 48, 27 per cent deducted.

Clay—Horses 3.91, 16 per cent added; cattle 3.90, 2 per cent deducted; mules 3.87, 30 1/2 per cent added; sheep 60, 42 per cent deducted.

Harrison—Horses 4.47, 1 1/2 added; cattle 3.85, 2 3/8 per cent deducted; mules 3.99, 37 per cent added; sheep 1.00, 95 per cent deducted.

Scott—Horses 4.67, 8 1/4 per cent deducted; cattle 4.01, 41 per cent deducted; mules 7.14, 52 per cent deducted; sheep 33 1/3, 6 per cent added.

Hazard—Horses 5.13 1/2, 11 1/3 per cent deducted; cattle 3.89, 1 1/2 per cent deducted; mules 7.09, 28 per cent deducted; sheep 77, 55 per cent deducted.

Bristol—Horses 4.00, 13 1/2 per cent added; cattle 3.56, 7 2/3 per cent added; mules 5.00, 1 per cent added; sheep 39, 10 per cent deducted.

Board now adjourned to June 17, 1901.

All members of board and county clerk present and the following additions and deductions were made from the assessor's returns on real estate in the several townships:

Harrison, 3 per cent deducted; Logan, 14 per cent added; Washington, 2 1/2 per cent added; Elm, 10 per cent added; Webster, 6 1/2 per cent deducted; Loup City, 7 per cent deducted; Ashton, 11 per cent deducted; Rockville, 5 per cent deducted; Clay, 18 per cent added; Scott, 1 1/3 per cent deducted; Bristol, 3 per cent deducted.

No additions or deductions were made on lands in Harrison and Hazard township.

Board adjourned to June 18, 1901.

All members of the board were present and passed the day in matters of equalization. The board adjourned to June 19, 1901, 9 o'clock a. m.

The forenoon was passed in matters of equalization and the afternoon in the transaction of general business.

Before the board came Melvin Butler of Harrison township and requested that Sherman county assist Harrison township in rebuilding a bridge. On motion \$50.00 was donated from the county bridge fund for that purpose, provided said bridge be 24 ft long, 16 ft wide, and twelve ft from the bottom of the creek to the floor of the bridge.

The official bonds of Chas. Lindall, Wm. Minne, Chas. Landon, W. H. Barnes, Arnold Coon, James Spragusberg, G. W. Bramer, Wenkel Kostal and Chas. Coulter, overseer of highways, were approved, and the bonds of J. N. Black, Edwin Munn and G. W. Bramer as township officers were also approved.

In the matter of the petition for the establishment of a road commencing at the south west corner of Section 23, T. 13, R. 14 it was ordered that said road be established provided Bristol township pays to Wm. Meekish damages in the sum of \$10.00 as allowed by this board. John Long as attorney for Meekish gave notice of appeal.

On motion the county treasurer is ordered to cancel tax sale certificates on lots 13 to 16 inclusive, Block 15, L. & K's add. to Loup City.

On motion the clerk is ordered to strike from the tax list of 1899 the poll tax of N. J. Stott, she not being liable therefor.

The request of Wm. Meekish for a new survey of the road as prayed for by Albert Holub and others and this day established was denied. John Long as his attorney excepting.
