The above facts are mentioned only because I expect to be placed fairly before the people. I am not on the defensive but am proud of the record made and mean to maintain it. If I must cringe to a tax shirker for a vote I do not want it, neither will I stultify the principles of honor and justice for an office.

'Fiat justitia ruat cælum, Let justice be done though the heavens may fall' is our motto. There is no patrician cast for me. The poorest is my friend, the richest get justice, but unequal favors to none.

This is our platform, upon it we stand or fall. I have no mud to sling neither will it be tolerated, and if any desire we will gladly take time to compare our work with that of others or investigate any grievance.
