Some Curious Insect Dishes for the Allaying of the Appetite.

The ancient Israelites ate locusts, fried in oil, and many modern travelers in Africa have pronounced well-cooked locusts to be both succulent and nourjshing, with something of the taste of poiled eggs. The old great philosopher, Socrates, who knew several things, considered a dish of well-cooked grasshoppers to be more toothsome than quail on toast, and the French army in good eating, but a valuable addition to army diet, and the old campaigners carried the custom back home with them, so that today grasshoppers are valued in many French provinces as an article of food.
