Thunder Mountain, the new Idaho gold field, is the most promising mineral region in the U. ited States. In a few weeks two miners last spring cleaned up \$7,500 in placer gold, using a small cotton hose to wash the gravel, the water coming from a small reservoir on the mountain side. The mineral zone covers a large section of hitherto unexplored country. and is about 175 miles from a railroad.

There are five routes leading to the Thunder Mountain country, viz.: via Ketchum, Mackay, Boise and Welser, Idaho, and Redrock, Montana, all on the Oregon Short Line railway. A scarcity of pro-visions at present keeps miners away, as flour at \$50 per sack is considered somewhat of a luxury even in the golden land.




