

The trunk line of the Union Pacific passes amounted to 548,206 tons of freight for each across the State of Nebraska, and it is a valuable property. The figures presented show that it pays taxes amounting to \$473.22 per mile in the State of Nebraska, and through the payment of this amount of tax in this state, it made the average tax per mile \$262.79 on the whole line of road in the year 1900. The Inter-State Commerce Commission reports show that the average tax paid by railroads in Nebraska was \$198.86 and the average west of the Mississippi was but \$171.45. These figures show that in Nebraska the Union Pacific Railroad pays much more tax than the average railroad pays, and it pays much more proportionate taxes than it should pay.
