As per call of W. R. Mellor, Chairman and W. S. Waite Secretary of the Republican county central committee, the Republican convention for Sherman county convened at Society hall, in this city, last Friday, at 11:00 o'clock a. m., and placed in nomination a full county ticket, elected delegates to state and judicial conventions and transacted such other business necessary to be done.

The convention was called to order by chairman Mellor, who, after reading the call announced the appointment of R. J. Nightingale as temporary chairman and Ed. B. Arthaud, of Ashton as temporary secretary.

The appointed officers took their respective positions and after a ringing speech by Mr. Nightingale, the convention proceeded to work.

On motion the chair was instructed to appoint the various committees which he did as follows:

After the committees were appointed the convention took a recess to 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The afternoon session was called to order by chairman Nightingale and the committee on credentials was asked to report. The report was as follows:

"We, your committee on credentials beg leave to make the following report and recommend the following named persons be declared the duly authorized delegates to the Republican county convention to be held at Loup City Nebraska, on the 14th day of August A. D. 1903.

The report on the permanent organization then followed and recommended that the convention proceed to elect a chairman and secretary. It was adopted and a motion prevailed to make the temporary organization permanent.

The next committee reported the following order of business:

- 2nd. " Treasurer
- 3d. " Sheriff,
- 4th. " Superintendent,
- 5th. " Judge,
- 6th. " Coroner,
- 7th. " Surveyor,
- 8th. " Assessor,
- 9th. Six delegates to the state convention.
- 10th. Six delegates to the judicial convention.
- 11th. Election of county central committee.

The report of the committee on resolutions was then read and adopted and committee discharged. The resolutions as accepted will be found following these minutes.

The convention then proceeded to business and a resolution was passed to proceed to the nomination of county officers by ballot, the chairman of each township to deposit the vote of his delegation at the secretary's desk. S. H. Conger, of Webster township and Cal Shaupp of Ashton were duly appointed tellers and according to the rules adopted, an informal ballot was ordered on the nomination of a candidate for county clerk.

The informal ballot was almost unanimous for G. H. Gibson for county clerk, and by motion it was made formal and Mr. Gibson was declared the unanimous choice of the convention and its nominee for the office mentioned.

An informal ballot for county treasurer brought out several names among them the most prominent being, Geo. W. Holmes, Geo. Truelsen, and C. Truelsen. The third ballot however resulted in the nomination of Mr. Holmes whose nomination was made unanimous. Mr. Holmes thanked the convention for the honor conferred and his remarks were received with a cheer.

Several ballots were taken on sheriff, the most prominent of the candidates brought out to fill this important place on the ticket were L. A. Williams, of Ashton Henning Clausen of Washington and C. J. Tracy of Logan; each started off with a good following, Williams, however in the lead. Some five or six ballots were taken which resulted in Mr Williams being chosen as the candidate.

The next in order being the nomination of superintendent, an informal ballot was taken and the names of Louis Oney, of Harrison and Ed. B. Arthaud were brought out. Although Mr. Arthaud had a good vote, the first ballot showed a clear majority for Mr. Oney and a motion to make the informal ballot formal resulted in the latter's nomination. Mr. Oney accepted the nomination in a few well chosen words and as he took his seat was heartily applauded.

An informal ballot was then taken on a candidate for county judge and though several of the best men in the county were named for that office none of them seemed to be in a position to stand for the nomination and one after the other respectfully declined. At this juncture a happy solution to the question was made when Smelser, of Ashton moved to suspend the rules and nominate Robt. P. Starr by acclamation. The motion prevailed and Mr. Starr, almost before he was aware of it, was unanimously chosen as candidate for county judge. It was a good choice and Mr. Starr accepted the nomination in a ringing speech which was cheered to the echo.

The rules were suspended and Walter Moon was chosen by acclamation to take place on the ticket as candidate for county surveyor and Judge Hunter was named for coroner.

Next in order came the nomination of county assessor. Among the most formidable candidates for this most important office were Jacob Albers, L. Bechtold, Carl de la Motte, E. G. Paige, Wm. Callen Hennig Clausen, and John Mathewson. Each had a good vote and it soon became apparent that as regards the first four names, who seemed to have a good lead on the start, could not be nominated and after several ballots had been taken the change drifted to Mr. Clausen who received a handsome majority on the ninth ballot. Mr. Clausen's nomination was made unanimous and the convention seemed well pleased with the result of the contest.

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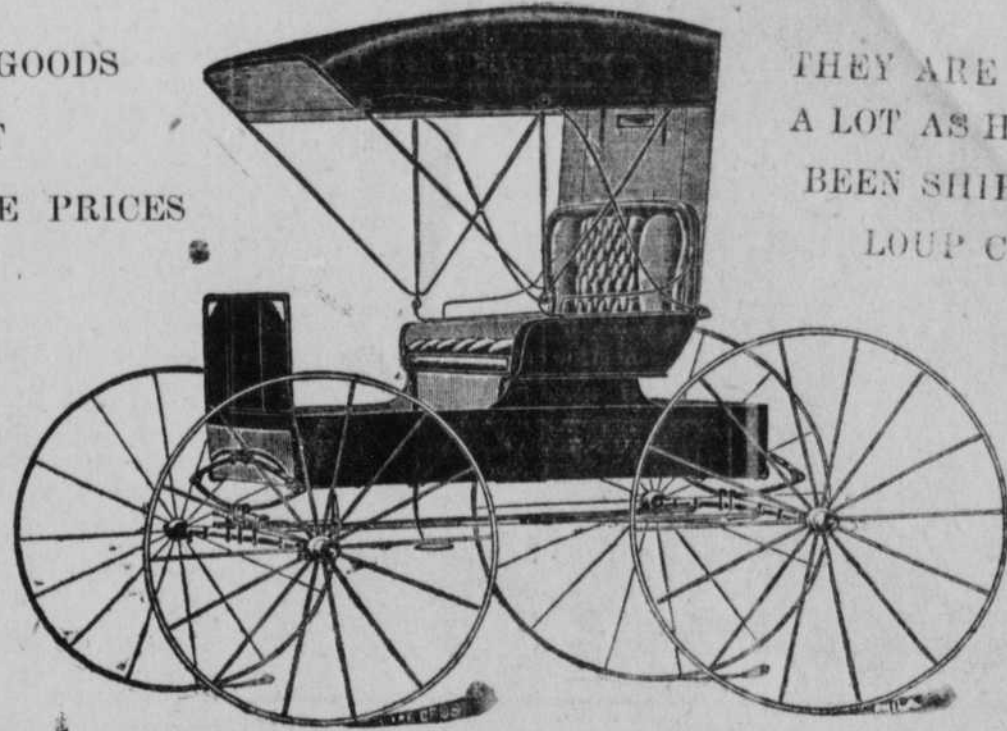
