FRANCHISE TO THE LOUP CITY TELEPHONE COMPANY,

ORDINANCE NUMBER 61.

An ordinance granting certain rights and privileges to the Loup City Telephone company, its successors and assigns, regulating erection of poles and wires and protecting the same in the village of Loup City, Nebraska.

Be it ordained by the Chairman and Loup City, Nebrasks:

Section 1. That the Loup City Teleweek with a very pretty Christmas assigns be and are hereby granted right the medicine. To my great relief the number and it was accompanied with of way for the erection and maintenance nances thereof, for the purpose of transicting a general telephone and telegraph business through, upon and over having done such an artistic job and the streets, alleys and public grounds of said company shall at all times when requested by the proper authorities permit their poles and fixtures to be used for the purpose of placing and maintaining free of charge any wires which may be necessary for the police or fire departments of the villiage of Loup City, such streets and alleys.

> Section 9. That in no case shall said exceed one dollar and fifty cents per month for one phone in any buisness house in said village of Loup City. Any ment of five dollars per month per line, or 50 cents per mon h for each phone.

Section 3. Whenever it shall be necessary for any person to move along or across any of said streets or allyes any vehicle or structure of such height or size as to interfere with any poles or wires so erected the company using and oporating such poles or wires shall, upon recieving twenty-four hours notice, served in writing upon their agent or on deposit. manager at Loup City, temporarily remove such poles and wires from such place as must necessarily be crossed by Mitchell vs Watson, such vehicle or, structure, and provided John Igon, plff. Section 4. Any person who shall interfere with, cut, injure, remove or destroy any of the poles, wires fixtures, instruments or other propety of the said telephone company or its succesdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, and any person who shall fixtures of said company, any sign lar nor more than fifty dollars.

Section 5 This franchise shall terminate at the end of 20 years from officers for the coming year:
