

## Trip to Yellowstone Park

it threw water to a height of 50 feet, for a period of 15 to 20 minutes. On our return, we witnessed Old Faithful in one of its regular 68-minute eruptions, which continue for four minutes, throwing immense volumes of hot water a distance of 100 feet in the air, then subsiding, to again play at its regular stated intervals. This is the geyser which all tourists have the pleasure of beholding in action, and one day spent at this point impresses one with the ideas which the name expresses. After Old Faithful had subsided, we paid a visit to the formation on the other side of Firehole river, on which are the Bee Hive, Giantess, Punchbowl and many others. Here the formation is marked "Dangerous," and from the hollow sound, the numerous holes and the thin crust over which we walked, I think rightly named, for after we had been over it once, each seemed to breathe easier and declared once was enough. After supper, we had the good fortune to see the Giant, the castle and Old Faithful all play at the same time. The Giant geyser, as its name implies, throws water 200 feet in the air and continues from 30 to 60 minutes, and occurs once in ten or twelve days. The Castle's eruption occurs once in 25 hours and was about 60 feet high, throwing water about 30 minutes and afterward roaring steam an equal length of time. On our return from the Castle, we stopped in the "store" and purchased mementoes of our visit.

After a refreshing night's sleep, we waited a few minutes for the farewell eruption of Old Faithful and started on our journey across the Continental divide to the Thumb of Yellowstone lake. After crossing from the Atlantic to the Pacific slope, we stopped at Lacy creek and enjoyed a cool, refreshing drink, and a little farther on, from Shoshone Point, have a grand view of Shoshone lake and the Teuton mountains over in

Idaho, fifty miles away, and which are said to be over 14,000 feet in height.

We continue to ascend the slope of the Continental divide and at an altitude of 8,346 feet pass once more to the Atlantic slope. Sign boards mark the highest points. From Lake View we get our first view of Yellowstone lake, and one mile further we camped for lunch near the Thumb of the lake. After lunch, while walking among the geyser formations here, we came upon five deer, and secured snap shots of them with a kodac. Our afternoon's drive takes us to Bridge Bay, where we camped for the night. Our camping ground is a beautiful place overlooking the lake. The single item of interest, excepting the long stretch of pine woods and an elk, was the Natural Bridge, with its span of thirty feet about forty feet above a small stream.

### Official Call

#### For Republican State Convention

The Republicans of state of Nebraska are hereby called to meet in convention at the Auditorium in the city of Lincoln, on Wednesday, May 18, 1904, at two o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the following offices, to be voted for at the next general election to be held in the state of Nebraska, November 8, 1904, viz:

Governor.  
Lieutenant governor.  
Secretary of state.  
Auditor of public accounts.  
Treasurer.  
Superintendent of public instruction.  
Attorney general.  
Commissioner of public lands and buildings.

Eight electors of president and vice president.

And to elect four delegates at large and four alternates to the republican national convention to be held in the city of Chicago, Ill., on Tuesday, June 21, 1904; and for the transaction of such other business as may regularly come before said state convention.

The basis of representation of the several counties in said convention shall be the vote cast for Hon. John B. Barnes for judge of the supreme court at the general election held on Novem-

ber 3, 1903, giving one delegate for each 100 votes or major fraction thereof so cast for said John B. Barnes, and one delegate at large for each county. We give the apportionment of the following counties:

Buffalo	18	Hall	19
Custer	20	Howard	9
Dawson	13	Sherman	6
Greeley	6	Valley	9

In the meeting of the Nebraska Republican state committee, at which said state convention was authorized to be called, the following resolution was regularly adopted:

"Whereas, There is a general demand by the voters for a direct vote on candidates for United States senators, and believing in the justice of such demand, Therefore be it

Resolved, That we hereby recommend to the state convention, now called, that when convened it nominate some candidate for United States senator:

That we recommend to each county convention that in the election of delegates to the state convention they give said subject fair consideration:

That we recommend each county convention nominating its legislative ticket before said convention is held, to pledge said nominees to support the nominee of the state convention for United States senator, if any nomination be made."

It is recommended that no proxies be allowed in said convention, but that the delegates present thereat be authorized to cast the full vote of the county represented by them.

It is also recommended and strongly urged that all counties shall complete their county organizations by selecting their county committees and the officers thereof prior to the date of the holding of said state convention.

Notice is hereby given that each of the odd numbered senatorial districts in the state is to select a member of the state committee to serve for the term of two years. By order of the state committee.
