
It was not long ago that Abraham Lincoln of Churchtown, Lancaster county, Pa., visited the Red Lion Tavern. This Abraham was tall and lean and rough hewn as to the face like the greater Abraham whose kinsman he was. He hitched his horse near the signpost and sat on the tavern porch.

Red Lion was a famous mixer of this drink. Mr. Lincoln did not know how nental officers. However, he said that shrub was a kind of syrup made chiefly in the West Indies, made with lime or lemon juice and Jamaica rum in quantities greater or less. A "Copenhagen" was another favorite drink of the time and place, again a mystery but most probably a mixture of gin and sugar, with perhaps other things. At all events, the old barroom of the one pint of the mixture. The formula Red Lion has seen many great men drinking these two old-fashioned drinks.

From the tavern Mr. Lincoln, who has since died, pointed out over some red hills the farm of 250 acres owned by the father of Daniel Boone. Daniel himself having seen the light, he said, about a mile north of the old inn, in 1733; the Lincoln of that day was called Mordecai, the president's greatgrandfather; the contemporary Hanks bore the name of John, and was the grandfather of the president's mother. Lincolns and Boones, by the way, still live about and trade in the country store in one end of the tavern build-

Cheap Fuel Used by Residents of Southern California.

The residents of Southern California have gone into partnership with the sun. There the sun is more plentiful than coal, and so they put the former to work, utilizing the heat rays for many purposes, one of which is known as the "solar water heater." By the plan they have adopted they make the sun heat the water in the

kitchens and bathrooms in the houses and for other domestic purposes. In California and other states where the sun may be depended on the item of fuel is entirely eliminated, and however cheap fuel may be, no fuel is cheaper than the sun.
