The county populist convention has been called for August 8th.

Sherman was one of the first five counties in the state to complete returns of assessment to the state board this year.

This district's senatorial convention met at Kearney yesterday. We have not learned the result, but of course Judge Wall received the nomination, as both counties instructed for him.

Will Maupic one of the mainstays of Bryan's Commover is being boomed for a state office (anything will do) by some of his democratic compatriots. Which reminds us that it was just ten years ago that the republican country press was shouting its head off for "Maup" for secretary of state. He was running a republican paper at North Bend then, but shortly after his defeat in convention he changed his politics and has been a malcontent ever since.—St. Paul Republican.

Senator Fairbanks was born in Ohio, in Union county. His nomination preserves the long established rule, as recognized among the republicans, of having one Ohio man on their national ticket. Since the close of the civil war this rule has been deviated from on two occasions only—in 1884, when neither of the candidates was a native of Ohio, and in 1892, when both candidates were natives of Ohio. On the republican national ticket in 1868, 1872, 1876, 1880, 1888, 1892, 1896, and 1900, the candidate was a native of Ohio.

Last week's Kearney Hub contained nearly three pages of advertised lands and town lots in Buffalo county on which were delinquent taxes, the same being published according to the provisions of the new revenue law. A visit to our county treasurer shows that there is very little of such land or town lots in Sherman county, perhaps not over a dozen all told, which might come under the scavenger act, not enough to pay the county for any action, delinquent taxes being and having been paid in a remarkably satisfactory manner. That is another good reason for standing up for Sherman county.

After nearly a week of hard labor the democratic party at St. Louis last Friday night brought forth a platform and national ticket. The platform is a queer conglomeration of platitudes, complaints, whinings, fault findings, scoldings and reform promises, that reminds one of the explanation given by a teacher once regarding an address before a county normal by a hair brained professor, as being "a long way from beginning to end with nothing between." The candidates selected were Alton B. Parker of New York for Roosevelt to easily defeat, and an octogenarian named Davis of West Virginia, for second place, an extremely wealthy old man, who is owner of several banks, president of a railroad or two, and undoubtedly selected, as was English of Indiana for Cleveland's second term, because of the "bar!" he could command. The platform is silent on the money question, as a "catch-all" for votes, and leaves Silver Bryan and Gold Hill sobbing and hysterical in each others arms. Just imagine! Politics make strange bedfellows.

Loup City will hold a racing carnival and street fair, Aug. 4, 5 and 6. This was decided last Friday night at a meeting in Judge Wall's office, every business man being present and in full sympathy with the movement. Judge Wall, H. M. Mathew and M. C. Mulick will have charge of the event with power to make all arrangements. We hope to give full details next week.
