Information on the Game.

We append the following information in regard to base ball which may be valuable to those who love but do not thoroughly understand the rules:

A strike is any ball passing over the plate between shoulder and knee, or fouls made when two strikes are not already called on batter.

A batsman becomes a base runner instantly after a fair hit, or "four balls" or "three strikes" or being hit by a pitched ball.

A batsman is entitled to his base after four balls is called, or after being struck by a pitched ball, or when a fair hit batted ball strikes the umpire or the person of a base runner.

A base runner is out if the third strike, or a fair hit, or a foul be momentarily held by a fielder; if after three strikes or a fair hit he be touched with the ball in the hands of a fielder, before he touch first base; if the ball be held by a fielder while any part of his person is touching first base before the base runner touches said base; if he run more than three feet from a direct line from one base to another to avoid being touched with the ball in the hands of a fielder; if he fall to avoid a fielder in the act of fielding a batted ball; if at any time while the ball is in play he be touched by the ball in the hands of a fielder, unless some part of his person is touching a base; if a fair hit ball strike him before touching a fielder.
