Dispatches from Vladivostock and Sakhalin make no mention of developments there. The citizens of Vladivistok scout the idea of a siege and many are returning from their country villas. The long promised Japanese operations against Sakhalin and Vladivostok, which were expected to act as a diversion for General Kuroki's advance, are not yet in sight.

Neither the admiralty nor the foreign office is inclined to attach importance to charges of a breach of neutrality over the supply of Welsh coal by German steamers to Vice Admiral Rojestvensky's squadron and to Russian cruisers in the Baltic. It is declared that there can be no breach of neutrality in coaling Russian war ships outside of Russian territorial waters. This whole question was thoroughly discussed by eminent jurists at an earlier stage of the war and resulted in the admirality's decision not to seek coaling facilities in neutral ports which might lead to implications, but to adopt the independent course of coaling war ships at sea. This course does not by either Great Britain or Germany open to suspicion of favoring Russia, for, though German colliers were used on the occasion in question, the repsonsibility of the German government was not involved, as is shown by the semi-official note in the Aligemeine Zeitung and obviously Great Britain is unable to follow up every departing

"The president has today issued an order, through the acting secretary of state, directing that the Russian armed transport Lena, now at San

Francisco, be taken into custody by the naval authorities of the United States and disarmed. The main fea-


